




send a message of love and encouragement too?) They also remind me of some of the letters written in the New Testament to Christians who were growing weary, struggling and suffering greatly.

The Bible encourages us not to lose heart (2 Corinthians 4:1 & 16)

A lot of the New Testament is written to Christians who were growing weary and struggling. It was jolly hard for those early believers and so many Bible texts urge and encourage them to keep on going and not to lose heart.




God is with us



FOOD HAMPER DISTRIBUTION

Susan, our Centre Manager was busy last week involved in a project organized by FVAF (Forest Voluntary Action Forum), distributing 100 hampers to Secondary schools across the Forest of Dean, including Wyedean School. This was a collaboration with the Local Equality Commission, Sixteen Community Café, FareShare and The Forest Foodbank creating hampers with essential cupboard goods, recipe cards and stationery.

Foodbanks have reported a massive 61% increase in demand with tens of thousands of people using food banks for the first time.





Wye Valley Green Way

Those of you who have not already discovered it, may be interested to hear that the Wye Valley Green Way cycle and footpath is now partially open. It can be accessed from Snipe Hill Bridge

via Sedbury Lane, or from beside the railway bridge on the small lane between Bishton and Netherhope Lanes. From Snipe Hill it is now possible to walk along the embankment, with wonderful views over the A48 bridge and past the Diving Centre.

At this point there are quite a few interesting remains: the original Tidenham Station buildings, signal box and goods shed were all demolished after the halt closed to passengers in 1959. However, the site was taken over by the quarry and the original platform concreted over to form part of a loading facility for ballast stone. About half of that platform is still visible, the rest having been buried under a mound of soil which we understand will one day become a car park for walkers and cyclists. On the platform stands a large wooden structure

which we think once supported the wagon-loading conveyor belt. At the northern end of the station site are two ornate metal gates which once allowed the quarry area to be closed off from the rest of the line. Beyond these the walk continues under the interesting road bridge with the distinctive metal under-structure and onwards past the site of Netherhope Halt to the tunnel entrance.

The tunnel is a winter roosting site for bats, so will remain closed until March. Thereafter it is due to open to the public and by the summer it will be possible to walk or cycle all the way from Sedbury to Tintern.

There are a number of interesting relics along the way and it to be hoped that these, along with the platform, will be preserved. The purpose of two of them remains a mystery. They are substantial, square, wooden posts, each topped with a pointed iron shoe. One is half buried in spoil just opposite the remains of the platform. The other, which is about 15ft high, stands beside the track

bed just to the north of the iron gates.

Does anyone know what purpose they served? Answers on a postcard (or better still an email) please!!

Monuments and graves at Tidenham Brian Duerden

We all know that the Parish Church of St Mary and St Peter, Tidenham, is a historic building (Grade II* listed) with a history going back to the 12th century and this history is reflected in the graveyard. We see a large number of ancient graves and monuments each time we walk through the churchyard to the church building, even if they may appear commonplace because we are so used to them being there. As well as the very prominent Madocke Monument opposite the main church door, 14 other monuments are Grade II listed.



Many of these old graves, mostly without living descendants to take an interest, have been untended for many years and have become increasingly overgrown, even to the extent that some are no longer visible. Although the Parish Council is now responsible for the general upkeep of the churchyard as it is

"closed" for new graves, this has not extended to attacking the overgrowth around many of the monuments which is probably regarded as a "church matter". Much to our delight, two people from the Tidenham Historical Group have come to our aid and have taken the initiative to help expose these historic artefacts and in so doing, greatly improve the appearance and relevance of the churchyard.

Carol and Richard Clammer and the four members of the Lillington family, working as two individual family teams under current Covid restrictions, have started with the vegetation around the Madocke Monument and then moved to the ones immediately behind, including finding a further unsuspected monument that was completely overgrown. This work not only has historic interest but also markedly

enhances the view out from the main door of the church. They are now progressing to the monuments along the pathway to the Lych Gate and also the ones on the slope in the South-east area towards the car park.



The work will cease shortly for the nesting season (birds and other wildlife) which means that no such clearing work should be done from March to the end of July. However, as and when restrictions are lifted, I would encourage anyone with an interest to have a look round at some of the quite amazing work that is being done. I am writing this to express our thanks to those taking on this project and excitement about what it is producing.

OFFA'S DYKE



A recent talk by Jon Hoyle, the archaeologist and author of "Hidden Landscapes of the Forest of Dean", to the Forest of Dean Local History Society revealed that there is a strong opinion that some of the clearest sections showing aspects of the construction of Offa's Dyke are located in our area.

Hidden Landscapes of the Forest of Dean

There are 2 particular sections which demonstrate

this: by the Devil's Pulpit and the other in Caswell Wood near Tidenham. They demonstrate that there was very likely a cap of stone on top of a high bank with a steep ditch behind it to the east from where the

excavated material was quarried. The steep bank was also possibly faced with stone. Then another shallower, bank and ditch faced west.

There is also a good section in Chapel House Wood in Tutshill but it has been quite badly eroded by badgers.



One other intriguing observation he made was that the Dyke appears to have been built in short lengths in addition to the previously identified larger gaps



Spend less when redecorating


If you've got the urge to redecorate, first try rearranging the furniture. This could help to give your room a new lease of life for free.

Spring Clean Your Finances

Did you start the year strong, setting realistic goals, despite the pandemic? Perhaps the long, cold winter combined with another national lockdown affected you mentally, physically or financially. Maybe you started the year focusing on getting fitter, healthier and aiming to watch the pennies, but it's been so hard to stay on track in the midst of the storm of challenges the world is currently facing.

Wherever you're at, it's a good idea to take time to review your finances. Checking in with where you're at financially can help to relieve stress and gives you the chance to get help sooner, if needed, rather than putting it off.

update from Tom Clammer

Some of you might be aware that since I found myself needing to retire from paid ministry in the Church of England a couple of years ago I have been trying to work out where my vocation might lie moving forward.

For the past couple of years I have been exploring potentially becoming a Brother of the Anglican Order of Cistercians. This is a relatively young Order, which seeks to recover something of the Cistercian charism

within the Anglican churches of Great Britain.

You will be aware of the ancient presence of the Cistercians within the Wye Valley, symbolized in the enduring presence of the ruins of Tintern Abbey.

Fundamentally the life is one of worship, contemplation and underpinning of the active church in prayer. In my case the focus of this

prayer will be on supporting and enabling the life of the parishes. There is a commitment to at least five liturgical moments of prayer each day, together with study, reading and silence. All of this is lived fully in the secular world, and in my case in the context of my vocation to be an Anglican priest, and to be married to Emma.

Having been an enquirer, and then for the last 18 months a postulant, I am able to announce that the Chapter of the Order have agreed to admit me as a novice on the Feast of St Joseph the Worker, on 19 March


this year. I will spend several years as a novice, deepening my understanding of the Cistercian way, after which I may be invited to make the vows of Obedience, Stability and Conversion of Life. You won't see any immediate evidence of this development of my vocation, other than the letters OC appearing after my name. In due course you might also see that I begin to appear wearing the habit of the Order rather than a cassock and collar, as secular clergy do.

If you were able to take a moment on 19 March to pray for me, together with my fellow postulant Heller, who is also becoming a novice that day, that would be a kindness.



climate change, with more flooding, wildfires and hunger we need to make wise decisions about what we buy. In Micah 6 v 8 we read, "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

- Annual church meeting is planned to be held at Tidenham church on Sunday 25th April at 10.30 a.m. approx. [subject to Covid]

How one might listen to God through the Bible.

As part of the Lent gatherings on a Wednesday we have used a simple but powerful method of prayerfully reading the Bible called 'Lectio Divina.' The 24/7 prayer team explain Lectio Divina as follows...

Lectio Divina is a simple method of praying and meditating on scripture by oneself or in a group.

Lectio Divina is a Latin phrase meaning 'divine reading'. This is a form of meditation on the word of God that trains us to listen to His whisper speaking personally to our hearts, allowing His word to become one with us. Lectio Divina is a reflective and repetitive way to read the Bible, that is not so much focused on becoming informed by the text but rather being transformed by it. It does not replace the other types of Bible reading - rather Lectio Divina adds depth and value to all other forms of Bible reading, facilitating a movement from our hearts to more active ways of wrestling with scripture. Here we are reading purely in the devotional sense – reading for relationship with God more than a type of mental assent to learn more about God. We read the passage not so much as a student seeking to master the subject but as a child receiving a love-letter from a deeply committed and adoring Father.

How to do the Lectio Divina

If we think of a cow chewing on the cud, we are as close to discovering the way of Lectio Divina as we may get: meditating on the scripture, we salivate on a divine word or phrase, tasting and savouring, then regurgitating and savouring some more, before we swallow the word finally into our being, trusting the process of digestion will bring strength and nourishment to our bodies. *(continued)*

Here are six simple steps:

1. Read

Pick a passage. To begin with, choose any of the Psalms or a passage in one of the Gospels. After inviting the Holy Spirit to come and guide you, read the passage slowly, out loud if you can. Read it twice with one minute of silence in between.

2.Relish

We could use the word 'reflect' here also, but relish describes more what we're aiming for at this stage. Meditating on the passage you have read, savour one word or phrase that you have noticed more than others during your reading. Write this word down and begin pondering what God might be saying to you through this. How is this word speaking to your life?

3. Re-read

Read the passage one more time.

4. Respond

Speak out in prayer what you sense God is saying to you. Tell Him how you feel encouraged, challenged by what He is saying to you and ask that the seed of His word in your heart would develop deep rooted truth that would lead to fruitfulness in your life.

5. Rest

Simply take some time to allow God to wrap you in His love, and let the word He has given you rest on you.

6. Resolve

Finish by articulating one way you might be able to live out the word that has penetrated your heart in your daily life.
