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### **GOVERNANCE, STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

### Governing Document

Tidenham Parochial Church Council (The PCC) is a body corporate established by the Church of England. All PCCs are governed by two pieces of Church of England legislation, called Measures:

- the Parochial Church Measure (1956) as amended and
- the Church Representation Rules (contained in Schedule 3 to the Synodical Government Measure 1969 as amended). They were revised in 2011 and completely rewritten in 2019, coming into effect on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2020.

#### Aims and purposes

All PCC members are Trustees of the charity. The PCC is responsible for: -

- co-operating with the incumbent in promoting in Tidenham parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical for the public benefit.
- making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish, including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent.

#### **Objectives and activities**

The PCC seeks to promote the whole mission of the church by engaging in activities including: -

- the holding of regular public worship services open to all;
- the provision of sacred space for personal prayer and contemplation;
- pastoral work including visiting the sick and bereaved;
- teaching Christianity by sermons, courses and small groups;
- taking Christian assemblies in local schools;
- provision of children and youth activities with a Christian ethos;
- promoting Christianity through staging other events and meetings;
- carrying out the mission of the Church by the provision of activities for senior citizens, parents and other special needs groups;
- regular provision of a parish magazine to show community and church ideas and activities;
- supporting other charities in the UK and overseas.

Grant making is not a primary activity. However as part of its charitable purpose of promoting the whole mission of the Church, the PCC makes grants to other charitable organisations with complementary activities which help us achieve our purpose.

#### Public Benefit - - Engaging with the community

In planning the activities for the year, the incumbent and the PCC have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. Built in to the parish vision is a commitment to 'doing relationship well' and therefore a strong emphasis is placed on building community, loving engagement and wellbeing within the Parish. In particular we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through: -

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish
- volunteering and loving service day by day

#### PCC Structure

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. It consists of both ex-officio and elected members, and all members have full charity trustee responsibilities.

#### *Ex-Officio PCC members*

Tidenham PCC consists of the following ex officio members: the vicar, two churchwardens, curates, readers and Deanery Synod Representatives.

#### Forest South Deanery Synod

Three church members are elected every three years at the APCM to sit on Forest South Deanery Synod and become ex-officio members of the PCC. This provides the PCC with an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the Church. Deanery Synod members were elected at the 2020 APCM for a 3-year term.

#### Electing PCC members

In addition, twelve ordinary PCC members are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) by those members of the congregation who are on the church electoral roll of the parish. PCC members are also elected for a 3-year term, with a third of members elected each year. The PCC may co-opt up to two additional members as necessary.

The APCM must be well advertised and held by 31 May each year using a standard agenda. APCMs were duly held in Tidenham church on Sunday 25 April 2021 and on Sunday 08 May 2022. As the annual accounts for 2021 had not been independently examined by that date, the Bishop of Gloucester authorised a Special Parochial Church Meeting in Tidenham church on Sunday 25 September 2022 when the annual accounts for 2021, which had by that date been independently examined, were presented to parishioners.

### Church Electoral Roll of Tidenham Parish

All those who attend services in the Parish are encouraged to register on the Church Electoral Roll, which is reviewed each year by the PCC prior to the APCM. Church members are encouraged to stand for election to the PCC, if they have the appropriate gifts, skills and commitment to contribute to the spiritual life of the parish and the management of the church's affairs.

The Church Representation Rules require each PCC to create a completely new church electoral roll every six years, and this was duly achieved during January and February 2019 in advance of the 2019 APCM.

At 01 January 2021 there were 189 people on the church electoral roll, of whom 144 lived in the parish. The roll was revised in April 2021 in advance of the APCM. At 31 December 2021 there were 182 people on the church electoral roll, of whom 137 live in the parish. The roll was further revised in April 2022 in advance of the APCM. At 31 December 2022 there were 182 people on the church electoral roll, of whom 137 live in the parish.

#### **PCC Management**

#### PCC Meetings and sub-committees

The full PCC met ten times during 2021 and eight times during 2022 with an average attendance of 77% in 2021 and 58% in 2022. Safeguarding, health and safety, and data protection are mandatory topics for the agenda. Once signed the Minutes are public documents and are available from the PCC Secretary. Highlights of the PCC meetings are published in the Link church magazine.

Given its wide responsibilities the PCC has a number of committees, each dealing with a particular aspect of parish life. These sub-committees, which include buildings, finance and charity giving, are responsible to the PCC and report back to it regularly.

The PCC has also authorised certain church members to be responsible for particular areas of church activity, such as safeguarding, health and safety, pastoral visiting, liaison with Tutshill Church of England primary school, visiting families to prepare for baptism, and care home services. The members of these committees and post holders are reviewed each year at the first PCC meeting after the APCM.

#### CHURCH BUILDINGS

### General

To facilitate our activities it is important that we maintain the fabric of the three church buildings in the parish. In November and December 2022 our church architect undertook the Quinquennial Inspections of our buildings. As part of this process a drone survey was conducted for the first time. All work arising from the 5-yearly fixed wiring inspections carried out in 2022 by an NICEIC-approved contractor was completed.

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### Tutshill church

The recently re-ordered main church building has required no significant work in 2021 or 2022. The Servery was completed in 2021 and the PA desk was completed in January 2022. Our Broadband connection went live in July 2022 and a new portable altar was consecrated later that year in October by Bishop Robert.

### **Tidenham church**

Tidenham church has required no significant work in 2021 or 2022. The PCC continued to develop plans to refurbish / repair the tower and in November 2022 submitted its request for a faculty to the DAC. The PCC is supporting the Friends of Tidenham in their ongoing scheme to reorder the north aisle.

### **Tidenham Chase church**

Chase church has required no significant work in 2021 or 2022.

### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

### Covid 19 Crisis - 2021

Revd Treharne's small Covid working group originally set up in 2020 continued to review how the PCC should comply with the fast changing Covid Regulations taking account of the extensive guidance provided centrally by the Church of England, supplemented by information and guidance from Gloucester Diocese. Covid significantly impacted every aspect of normal church life and activities throughout the year. Church buildings were closed for many weeks, meeting fellow Christians was



severely restricted or banned, church services moved online, and many church meetings were cancelled or held via Zoom. We had very limited face to face services in schools and care homes. Following the easing of UK Government restrictions, face to face Public worship resumed on Easter Sunday 4 April with indoor services at Tidenham and Chase, and an outdoor service at Tutshill.

We continued to evolve new ways of being relevant to the community: -

- Zoom was used for a virtual Sunday morning coffee and chat time.
- Hard copy of weekly briefings and sermons was mailed out to those without access to the internet
- Some people who had connections with the parish, but now lived far away, were able to join our online services which they had not previously been able to do.

### Covid 19 Crisis - 2022

Although all UK Government's legal restrictions ceased on 19 July 2021, their extensive guidance and that of the Church of England centrally and Gloucester Diocese meant that church life and activities were far from normal as we started the new year. Responsibility for determining what could be done in each parish rested with the incumbent, and Revd David took that responsibility very seriously, very ably assisted by his churchwardens. Although there was a blip of Covid cases in December 2021, the situation had eased by the end of January 2022, such that Revd David Treharne issued a public notice on 31 January, setting out the measures to be implemented at all of our public acts of worship. This meant that we restarted congregational singing and holy communion [in one kind] albeit with everyone still wearing masks.

Access to care homes was still limited and indeed our regular services at Care homes did not restart during 2022 due both to Covid, and staff shortages and other illnesses at the care home.

Communion in both kinds was not offered until Pentecost – 5<sup>th</sup> June.

It is still the case that by the end of the year a number of previously regular churchgoers did not feel able to return to public worship.

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#### **Public Benefit - Access to Church buildings**

St Luke's Tutshill and from 2022 Tidenham Chase were open to the public on 3 days a week for personal prayer, and access to the other churches can be provided on request to the Administration Assistant or churchwardens. The churches may be used for community purposes. Local Schools can use the Church for regular acts of worship during term time and for other services during the year.

#### Public Benefit - Worship and Prayer

Public worship is conducted by those licensed and authorised to do so by the Bishop of Gloucester, which as well as the incumbent, curates and readers of Tidenham Parish on page 2, includes Revd David Rees, an Ordained Local Minister from St Briavels and Hewelsfield.

Apart from during Covid lockdowns in 2020, all three churches in the parish held a public Christian worship service each Sunday with additional services at Tutshill and Tidenham during the week.

Through baptism we thank God for the gift of life, in marriage public vows are exchanged with God's blessing and, through funeral services, friends and family express their grief and give thanks for the life which is now complete in the world and to commend the person into God's keeping. In 2021 we celebrated 5 baptisms and 8 weddings and we held 34 funerals in our churches and at local crematoria. In 2022 we celebrated 12 baptisms and 5 weddings and we held 26 funerals in our churches and at local crematoria.



Parishioners are encouraged to learn about the Gospel, and to develop their knowledge and trust in Jesus, not only through teaching during services, but also by joining one of the small 'Life groups' which met regularly on weekdays via Zoom and latterly in person to discuss the Christian faith and how it affects their lives. The annual quiet day at Ty Mawr Convent, was cancelled in both 2021 and for a third year in 2022.

#### **Public Benefit - Pastoral Care**

Some members of our parish are unable to attend church due to sickness or age. The ordained ministers are assisted in the pastoral work by a pastoral visiting team, whose usual activities, providing pastoral care in local hospitals and via home visits to the bereaved, sick, elderly and housebound, all had to stop in 2021, and twelve months later were still not back to normal. In their place an expanded pastoral team of over 25 people maintained connections and offered support to church and community members. In 2021 we were unable to hold our monthly lunches at the local Woodcroft Christian Centre, which offered social activity for senior residents of the parish, but they finally resumed in September 2022. We were unable to restart the fortnightly visits to a local care home, though our Wellbeing Chaplain has made some limited visits.

In 2021 online and latterly in person activities were run for children and teenagers to help them explore Christianity in a fun and engaging way. We managed to hold regular virtual and latterly in person sessions for our Parish baby and toddlers groups.

From September 2021 our Wellbeing Chaplain spends the equivalent of one day a week at Sedbury Space, and visits many people both in their homes and places of work and liaises with the community, police and social services.

### **Mission and Evangelism**

An ordained Pioneer Minister left the parish in August 2021 and handed over her duties at Sedbury Space.

The PCC demonstrated its commitment to Mission and Evangelism in

September 2021 by expanding the existing work in the parish through two new posts: a new full-time Youth, Children and Families (YCF) Missioner and a wholly new part-time Wellbeing Chaplain. Both made presentations to the PCC. The YCF Missioner takes a monthly assembly at a local primary school and during summer 2022 collaborated with the Parish Council Youth Worker and Sportily to offer a comprehensive suite of activities for local youth.

The Parish produces a 'weekly briefing' for members and the wider community circulated on email, the Parish website and post to those with no access to online material. Easter and Christmas cards designed by members of the congregation were again delivered to every home in the Parish in 2021. The plan to repeat this in 2022 was only partially achieved as Royal Mail sadly failed to deliver any of the Parish Christmas cards. YouTube and Facebook posts reached well beyond the usual church membership.



The Link, our parish magazine, became a predominantly online magazine issued 4 times in 2021, but reverted to a printed magazine in 2022, but it is also now available via the parish website.

The church website provides information about our church buildings, life events, contact details and a comprehensive calendar of events.

During 2022 the PCC gave £2,882 (2021: £1,373), (2020: £2,770) to a range of other charitable causes in the local community, nationally and throughout the world.

### **Ecumenical Relationships**

As we are located right on the Welsh border, we are a member of the Chepstow-based Churches Together in Wales (Cytûn), participating in foodbank collections and Christians Against Poverty.

### STAFF

### Paid Staff

During 2021/22 the PCC employed a number of full and part-time staff, some of whose roles changed: -

- a part-time lay worker to lead the ministry to children and families was replaced in September 2021 by a full-time Youth, Children and Families (YCF) Missioner,
- a part-time Youth co-ordinator post ceased in January 2022
- a part-time administration assistant and
- a new part-time post of *Wellbeing Chaplain* was created in September 2021 to address the many issues highlighted by Covid.

#### Volunteers

The PCC relies almost entirely on volunteers to carry out its objectives, and thanks them for all they do to make our church in the Parish of Tidenham the active and vibrant community that it is.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

The PCC has a duty to identify and review the risks to which the church is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against those risks.

#### Safeguarding

The church engages in activities with children and young people and comes into contact with vulnerable people in the course of its pastoral ministry. The PCC has reconfirmed its acceptance of the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Parish Safeguarding Handbook.

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have due regard to The House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

The PCC has arranged for all trustees to undertake the mandatory domestic abuse training or obtain an exemption. Most members have successfully completed their training in 2022, but a few members are outstanding. The PCC was compliant by 28 February 2023.

The PCC has a safeguarding policy for working with children and young adults and a separate safeguarding policy for working with vulnerable adults. These key policies are reviewed, revised and reissued each year, usually at the first PCC meeting after the APCM.

The Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) ensured that:

- All volunteers were subject to the safer recruitment procedure before commencing work
- Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) certification was up to date
- All relevant training was provided.

There was one safeguarding incident during 2021, and a new safeguarding incident I 2022, both of which were reported to all the relevant agencies.

#### Insurance

The PCC has insurance policies covering both its church buildings and its activities. It has comprehensive health and safety policies, which are reviewed each year, and a contract for the provision and annual maintenance of fire extinguishers in its buildings.

#### **Data Protection**

The PCC has always taken its responsibilities for data protection very seriously, and issued a privacy notice in January 2021 and February 2022 as part of its review of the church electoral roll. The PCC has reviewed the data it holds and believes it complies with the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) 2018. No data protection issues were recorded during 2021 or 2022.

Financial Review 2021

As with most other areas of church life, our finances in 2021 continued to be affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The limitation of church services at the start of the year, along with the ongoing need to reduce cash handling, has significantly reduced income from collections. At £4,095 in 2021 this was a slight increase over £3,672 collected in 2020, but still 76% less than the £17,374 collected in 2019. This trend is likely to continue for the foreseeable future.

At £11,147 fee income from weddings and funerals was up £5,453 (96%) from 2020 and up £3,046 (37%) from 2019, as restrictions on such gatherings eased. Some of the church running costs decreased year on year due to the enforced reduction in activities, but not enough to avoid calling on the PCC's reserves, which exist for just such a time as this.

Total receipts (i.e. income) on the General Fund were £94,617 (2020: £86,698) (2019: £88,549), a 9% increase year on year. Total General Fund voluntary receipts of £80,092 (2020:£76,583) (2019: £77,119) increased by 4.6%, but without the £5.5k legacies in 2020 the increase over 2020 would have been £9,009 (12.7%). Income from the recovery of Gift Aid: £16,314 was up £3,873 (31%) over 2020 - £12,441.

The amount spent from the General Fund to provide Christian ministry throughout the parish was £91,560 (2021: £92,143) (2019: £88,812), a decrease of 0.6% year on year. Due to the Covid pandemic, the Diocese agreed to freeze the cost of the parish share, much of which pays indirectly for clergy stipends, pensions, housing and training, and so we paid £64,428 (2020: £64,427) (2019: £60,780). Church running

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costs were up 23% at £19,805 (2020: £16,046) (2019: £17,956) including utilities of £7495, (2020:£4,999) (2019: £5,357) and insurance of £4296 (2020: £3,931) (2019: £3,854). SSE subsequently refunded us £3843 due to overcharging us in 2021. This will be shown in the 2022 accounts. There were no Building repairs and improvements paid from the General Fund in 2021.

**The net result** was that General Fund receipts exceeded payments by £3,057, bringing the balance on the General Fund at 31 December 2021 to £32,657 (2020: £29,600) (2019: £35,045).

**Reserves Policy.** After a thorough review, PCC revised its General Fund reserves policy in December 2021. The new Reserves policy requires PCC to keep a reserve of £20,000 in its General Fund, and £5k between our main restricted funds: YCF and Wellbeing Project.

### **Restricted funds**

- 1. The fund made up of grants and other voluntary income to support youth, children and families (YCF) ministry stood at £62,867 (2020: £57,210) (2019: £41,955) at year end, thanks to the financial support of donors and particularly grant-making charities, from whom grants of £31,000 were received in 2021.
- 2. The fund for the project to refurbish and develop the interior of St. Luke's Church, Tutshill paid Cymru Kitchens £18,210 in December for the new servery completed in autumn 2021, and £1958 towards the cost of the new sound desk. We received a further £11,595 including donations and a grant towards the remaining works. At year end the balance was £14,331 (2020: £24,168) (2019: £18,474).
- 3. The new fund made up of grants and other voluntary income to support the new Wellbeing Project stood at £19,325 at the year end.
- 4. The PCC also paid fees of £1,296 for the conservation engineer's report on Tidenham tower roof, which the DAC requested as part of the faculty process. This cost was met by the restricted and designated funds for buildings maintenance and development. At the end of the year these funds stood at £10,422 (2020: £3,409) (2019: £3,463) restricted and £1951, (2020: £2,326) (2019: £3,335) designated.

**Total Receipts and Payments Summary** (i.e. Including all restricted and unrestricted funds) Total receipts for 2021 were £178,911 (*2020:* £145,042) (*2019:* £207,346) and Total payments for 2021 were £150,071 (*2020:* £130,810) (*2019:* £319,840).

**Total cash funds** at the year-end **were £158,928** (2020: £130,581) (2019: £116,349), held with Lloyds Bank, Monmouthshire Building Society and CBF Church of England deposit funds.

PCC Finance Committee

### Financial Review 2022

Total receipts (i.e. income) on the General Fund were £93,719 (2021:£95,042) (2020: £86,698) a 1.4% decrease year on year. Total General Fund voluntary receipts of £76,248 (2021:£80,092) (2020:£76,583) decreased by 4.8%. Income from the recovery of Gift Aid: £8,547 was down £7,767 (48%) over 2021: £16,314.

The amount spent from the General Fund to provide Christian Ministry throughout the Parish was **£100,175** (2021: £91,560) (2020: £92,143), an increase of 9.4% on the previous year. The Diocesan Parish share of £68,292 (2021 & 2020 : £64,428 & £64,427 respectively) was paid in full during the year. At £26,196 Church running costs were up 32.3% compared with the previous Covid affected year (2021 £19,805), including utility costs of £7,561 (2021 £7,495) (2020 £4,999). A refund of £3,843 was received from SSE during the year. The present fixed price contract with SSE ends in December 2023. Insurance costs during the year were £4,308 (2021 £4,296) (2020 £3,931). There were no Building Repairs and improvements paid from the General Fund in 2022.

**Reserves Policy** After a comprehensive revision in 2021, the reserves policy remains unchanged requiring the PCC to maintain a reserve of £20,000 in its General Fund and £5,000 between the main Restricted Funds being YC&F and Wellbeing Project and Wellbeing Chaplain.

### **Restricted Funds (See page 15)**

- 1. **YC&F.** On 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 the fund stood at £39,803 (2021 £62,867) (2020 £57,210).
- Wellbeing Project. On 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 the fund stood at £30,286 (2021 £19,325). A Grant of £10,000 was received from Gloucester County Council. During 2022 a new Restricted Fund was established by the PCC as a result of a Legacy of £20,000 for direct support of the Wellbeing Chaplain.
- 3. **Tutshill Re-ordering** £12,690 remains in the Fund as of 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 (2021 £14,331) (2020 £24,168). £3,035 VAT refund was received during 2022 with payment for the portable Altar and final payment being made for the sound desk.
- Tidenham Tower Repairs. A new Restricted Fund was created in January to cater for a £120,000 Legacy covering repairs to the tower. £109,497 is being held in it on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022; £11,203 being paid out for professional fees on which VAT is being reclaimed.
- Buildings (Fabric) Funds. £6,409 was spent from the Restricted Fund updating electrical circuits and control boxes in Tidenham church and repairs at the other two churches. On 31<sup>st</sup> December the Restricted Fund stood at £5,138 (2021 £10,422) whist the Designated Fund stood at £1,956 (2021 £1,951)
- 6. **During 2022 the PCC voted to rename one Restricted Fund and close two Restricted Funds.** The Tutshill Toddlers Fund was renamed Tutshill Baby and Toddlers Group (B.A.T.S) on 21 September to reflect the group's activities. The *New Baby* fund was closed and the remaining money (£489) moved to B.A.T.S, as it does the same work. *The Well* fund was closed and the remaining money (£1,164) moved to the Wellbeing Project as it does essentially the same work.

**Total Receipts and Payments Summary** (i.e., Including all Restricted, Designated & General Funds) Total Receipts for 2022 were £271,776 (2021:£179,336) (2020:£145,042) *and* Total payments for 2022 were £167,769 (2021:£150,566) (2020:£130,810)

**Total cash funds** at year-end **were £263,360** (2021:£159,353) (2020:£130,581), held with Lloyds Bank, Monmouthshire Building Society and CBF Church of England deposit accounts.

Live services were severely disrupted by the COVID-19 restrictions, but in 2021 services were held at: -

- St Mary and St Peter Tidenham on 38 Sundays (22 Sundays in 2020)
- St Luke's Tutshill on 37 Sundays (24 Sundays in 2020) and
- St Michael and all Angels Chase on 29 Sundays (11 Sundays in 2020)

There were no live Sunday services in the parish after Christmas Day 2020 until Easter Sunday 04 April 2021, when live services resumed, with no limits on numbers, but everyone was asked to use hand sanitiser on entry and to remain masked unless part of a choir or while reading the lesson or intercessions.

Normal church services resumed on 31 January 2022, but with guidance issued by Revd David Treharne. Holy Communion was celebrated in one kind only – i.e. the chalice was not used until Pentecost Sunday - 5 June 2022.

### CHARITABLE GIVING

**POLICY** - The PCC authorises the Treasurer to make grants totalling 10% of the surplus unrestricted income from the previous year i.e. data from 2020 is used to make grants in 2021. There is a spread of charities by size as well as by location, with a selection of local, regional, national and international beneficiaries.

**HEADLINES** - The PCC endorsed the Charity Giving Team's proposed allocations of £1,373 in 2021 and £2882 in 2022. This compares with £2,652 in 2020, £2,843 in 2019, £3,695 in 2018 and £2,815 in 2017.

**DETAILS** – Due to the significant reduction in monies available for distribution in 2021, the PCC had some difficult decisions to make. It agreed with a request from the Scarecrow Trail Committee to donate 10% of the funds raised to each of two local charities. Here is the full list of donations for 2021 and 2022.

**CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY (CMS)** - The Church continues to support Heather Johnstone from the Church Mission Society, who works for CMS in Tanzania and manages the Rehema Project, an empowerment project aimed at helping the most disadvantaged women and children in the diocese of Mara.

**RETIRING COLLECTIONS** - Church members have traditionally given additional monies to charities such as Crisis, Barnabas Fund and Tear Fund via either retiring collections at Harvest and Christmas, or monies collected at specific church services e.g. Remembrance Sunday plate goes to the Royal British Legion, and The Children's Society receives the collection at the church Christingle service. GHCT also receives significant money via the annual *Ride 'n Stride* event in September.

In order to avoid the impression that people attending church are asked to give additional monies, PCC has decided to stop most retiring collections. The exceptions are:

- **Remembrance Sunday:** where the collection will continue to be given to the Royal British Legion.
- Church Christingle service: where the collection will continue to be given to The Children's Society.

Congregations at Easter and Christmas will instead be advised of the means of supporting various charities such as Barnabas Aid, Tear Fund etc, but all collections at church services will remain for our General Fund.

Church Copyright Licence Review 2021 / 2022

### 1. Licencing and Costs

We obtain annual licences from Church Copyright Licensing International (CCLI), a private company that manages the copyright of many songs, books and films. The costs of covering all legally required copyright licences for our parish churches during the past year were as follows: -

- St Mary & St Peter, Tidenham (church category A). Under normal circumstances, a PRS licence is required to cover musical performances for fund-raising concerts and other non-church musical events. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, a decision was taken in July 2020 to allow this licence to expire and to be reviewed if circumstances change. At time of writing, no licences are currently in place for this church venue.
- St Michael's and All Angels, Tidenham Chase: none required
- St Luke's, Tutshill (church category B). All regular licences were renewed in September 2022 (2021) at a total cost (including VAT) of £828 (£731), comprising:
  - Church Copyright Licence (CCL) to reproduce song words that are in copyright, on a service sheet, songbook or computer projection, cost £152 (£145).
  - Music Reproduction Licence (MRL) to photocopy direct from music books or downloaded SongSelect data for use of the music group, cost £79 (£75).
  - SongSelect to download worship music, chords or words sheets in digital electronic format to enable the music group to play modern worship songs where music books are unavailable or tablet/projector display is required, cost £113 (£108).
  - PRS for Music Church Licence to perform non-music such as fund-raising concerts of classical and gospel choirs and the St Luke's Folk Club, cost £77 (£74)
  - PPL Church Licence. The PPL and PRS together, allow audio recordings (CDs, etc.) to be played on the premises in addition to performing live music, cost £77 (£74)
  - Copyright Licensing Agency (CLA) to photocopy from non-music books such as study books, games and puzzle books, cost £85 (£81)
  - Church Video Licence (CVL) to use clips of commercially available film which are authorised by the copyright holder for public display, £183 (£174)
  - Streaming Licence to allow legal streaming of live or recorded worship music on-line e.g. via YouTube, cost £62 (N/A)

These licences expire in September 2023 and cover activities in regular use at St Luke's main services (inchurch or on-line), off-site children's and schools ministries and other non-worship events.

A printed copy of the full licence certificate is displayed in Tutshill church porch.

#### 2. CCLI Reporting

All necessary reporting is currently being handled on a regular basis by the CCLI Administrator.

Fabric, goods and ornaments of the churches of the Parish

### 1. INTRODUCTION

- Revd Peter Quinnell, the inspector of Parish Registers and Records for Gloucester Archdeaconry visited Tidenham church on 04 October 2021 to review our parish records. He was satisfied that our records are in good condition and made a small number of recommendations which were addressed.
- In December 2022 PCC engaged our church architect Philip Belchere of Hook Mason architects based in Hereford to undertake the 2022 Quinquennial Inspections of our three churches. As part of this process we used a local drone surveyor to provide information in advance of the inspections instead of the usual ladders. This has resulted in the provision of increased up-close information, with a permanent record of the status of the buildings. There is the additional benefits of much reduced risk to the person conducting g the inspection, and at a reduced cost as it avoids the need for a builder to supply a ladder plus contractor.

### 2. FACULTIES.

All work carried out in our churchyards and buildings are subject to DAC approval in the form of an Archdeacon's written notice, or a Faculty

2.1 Archdeacon's written notices received in 2021: NIL

### 2.2 Archdeacon's written notices received in 2022: 3, all of which have been completed

- a new bench in Chase churchyard beside the area for the burial of ashes in memory of Carol Joy Sime
- a new bench in Tidenham churchyard beside the tower in memory of David and Dor Wootton
- the provision of Gigaclear broadband access to Tutshill church

### 2.3 Faculties applied for in 2017 and granted in 2018: A faculty to reorder St Luke's, Tutshill -

- Phase 1 was completed on 23 June 2019.
- Phase 2 works were due to be completed by September 2020, but due to COVID-19, the consistory court granted an extension to September 2022. Additional work has taken place, and we have requested a further extension to complete the final phase.

### **2.3** Faculties under application and discussion in 2021 and 2022

Faculties for restoration and reordering work at **St Mary and St Peter, Tidenham** 

- Our initial application for a faculty to repair the tower roof and repoint the tower walls together with associated repairs to the fabric of the tower has resulted in protracted ongoing discussions with DAC on the detail of these proposals. Following discussions with both our church architect and a conservation architect a revised application for a faculty was submitted in November 2022
- Initial application has been made for a faculty to reorder the church, including the provision of toilet, kitchen and parish office facilities. Discussions with DAC on these proposals are ongoing.
- Our Application for a faculty for the restoration of the Madocke Tomb was withdrawn in February 2021, due to the proposed work's excessive cost and minimal benefit.
- Further discussions have been held with DAC for our application for a faculty for a level pathway across the churchyard from the access established by Tidenham Friends in 2019. A site visit with the new Chancellor took place in September 2021.

### 3. MAINTENANCE OF THE FABRIC OF ALL THREE CHURCHES BUILDINGS

Normal maintenance of the three churches has continued throughout 2021 and 2022. A considerable amount of major work is still required to bring all our churches up to a satisfactory 21<sup>st</sup> century standard.

### Issues that concern all our churches: -

- Testing of Fixed electrical wiring and Portable electrical equipment PAT testing and fixed wiring inspections was not required in 2021, but preparations were made for PAT testing and fixed wiring inspections in each church were carried our between January and April 2022. All work recommended was carried out by 31 October
- Asbestos Registers for each church were reviewed on 25 October 2020.
- **Gutter & Window Cleaning.** In October 2021 the gutters were cleaned, and all windows cleaned both internally and externally, with Chase scheduled for spring 2022.
- Smartwater (required by our insurers Ecclesiastical) Smartwater was reapplied to metalwork at all three churches in 2017 and is valid for at least 5 years.
- Testing of Lightning Conductors (every 2 years) This was carried out at each church on 06 December 2022 with acceptable results at Tutshill and Tidenham, though some work is required at Chase.
- Terrier (i.e. the full inventory of the goods and chattels at each church) and
- Log Book (i.e. details of work carried out at each church) These documents were revised to reflect the work carried out at our churches during 2021/ 2022, and inspected by PCC members.

### 4. SPECIFIC ISSUES AT EACH CHURCH

### 4.1 Tidenham

1 The tower clock is maintained by Cumbria Clock Company (CCC). Planned maintenance was carried out in July 2021, but following this the clock regularly ran very fast and had to be stopped. Keith Scobie-Youngs, the MD of CCC spent an hour on site on 07 September and altered the arc of the pendulum to slightly retard the clock. Following this, the clock has kept perfect time.



Planned maintenance was successfully carried out on 25 July 2022.

2 **Tidenham Tower** The 2012 and 2017 QI reports recommended that major work be undertaken on the roof, but lack of funds prevented this. The Tower was inspected in November 2018 which concluded that it remained safe for public use. We applied for a Faculty in 2020 to create a new roof as specified by our church architect, but DAC asked us to seek the view of a conservation engineer to see if the roof could be repaired, due to its historically significant design. Conservation engineer Pat Ruddock's report confirms the Roof structure is of considerable historic interest, but is in a reasonably good condition, and is entirely repairable rather than needing to be replaced with a flat roof. The proposals will be permanent, but reversible and would have something like a 50-year life. While there is nothing urgent, the repairs should be done within 5 years.

The DAC Structural Advisor Sinclair Johnston made his first visit to Tidenham on Friday 04 June. His report agrees with Pat Ruddock's assessment. The next step was to get our church architect to revise his plans in the light of Pad Ruddock's report, as at that point we had no proposal to take to DAC and no clear indication of the project's cost.

The Chancellor and Kath Hilsden from DAC visited Tidenham on 20 September 2021, and met the vicar, churchwarden and friends of Tidenham. This was a very positive meeting; the Chancellor gave members a positive steer on what he expected to see as part of the proposed reordering and a revised application for a faculty was duly submitted to the DAC in November 2022.

We still hold a grant of £3000 from the Headley Trust (one of Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts), towards this work.

- 3 **Tidenham Church south wall**. On 23 May 2021 we suffered a major fall of plaster and rendering on the far side of the last window on the south side of the nave, nearest the tower. The area was cordoned off and following a visit from the DAC advisor it was concluded that following repointing work on the external wall, the wall had dried out, causing the plaster to become loose. A small working party removed the loose plaster in October, noting that the bare wall was completely dry. There have been no subsequent problems.
- 4 Tidenham organ was tuned on 25 May 2021 and in July 2022.

### 4.2 Tutshill

- 1. The reordering of the church is covered elsewhere in this Report.
- 2. A Leak at Tutshill toilets appears to relate to a defective valve in the toilet, but may be related to the servery works if they have increased the water pressure. JP has renewed the valve and is checking the situation
- 3. Gigaclear provided a business broadband connection on 15 July 2022.

### 4.3 Tidenham Chase

1 A piece of lead flashing from the west end of the church roof that came down in a storm was replaced by a local builder on 18 October.

### 5 CHURCHYARDS

1. The Parish Council is responsible for maintaining the closed churchyards of Tidenham and Tutshill.





- 2. Members of *Tidenham Friends* and *Tidenham History Group* have improved the visual appearance of Tidenham churchyard by removing considerable amounts of brambles, and weedy vegetation from a number of tombs. This work not only has historic interest but also markedly enhances the view out from the main door of the church. The work took place outwith the nesting season (birds and other wildlife) there was no clearing work from March to the end of July.
- 3. Tidenham PCC had applied for a faculty to restore the Madocke Tomb prominently situated opposite the main entrance to the church. It had used a grant to obtain a specification for the work, very reluctantly agreed to cancel the proposed renovation as it felt the quotation of £24k could not be justified. DAC had granted a faculty on the basis that the PCC had to use the contractor who had carried out the investigation.
- 4. Chase Churchyard. The revised grass mowing regimen has continued, allowing the growth of wild flowers and an improved habitat for wildlife
- 5. Greengrafters successfully removed the dead holly tree from the back of Chase churchyard in June 2021, without any damage to the surrounding gravestones.
- 6. Debris and rubble was removed from Chase churchyard in summer 2021.
- 7. Churchwardens are currently looking at further work to improve access to Chase churchyard.

#### 6 GOODS AND ORNAMENTS

- 1. The goods and ornaments in all three churches are generally in a satisfactory condition.
- 2. In August 2020 we ordered a portable altar for Tutshill church from Rosehill Furniture, Cheadle, with 8 week delivery promised. Despite repeated promises this did not happen and we were unable to cancel the order. We finally received the altar on 15 June 2022 and it was consecrated by Bishop Robert on 02 October 2022.

Some Highlights of What Happened in 2021 & 2022

Both 2021 and 2022 were years of upheaval and disruption and uncertainty both for the church and wider community due to the Covid 19 Pandemic and its aftermath. However, there were also some wonderful signs of God's faithfulness, life, light and hope in the midst of challenging times.

### **Gathering Online and In Person to Worship**

2021 and 2022 saw a mixed economy of worship as we gathered online and eventually in person too. Lockdown in 2021 meant that the church family was only able to meet online. The Parish YouTube Channel, Parish Facebook Group, Zoom, Website and Mailchimp have all become important points for gathering, connecting and worshipping.

rain on Christmas Eve 2021 was memorable. Due to all that had happened Life Group(s), Weddings and Baptisms seemed to have a greater depth to them! Outdoor Holy Communion under the Marquee in the Vicarage garden enabled people to gather



together whilst the once a month WWW... 'Worship Without Walls' Fresh Expression on the Tutshill School field behind St Luke's was a great blessing. Coming together again we realised even more that faith is not just 'me' and God, it is 'we' and God. For many people faith and life were found to be far less



fruitful, vibrant and happy when detached from the Body of Christ.

Whatever the reasons for people no longer gathering with us in here in Tidenham Parish, we grieve their absence greatly!

As 2022 came to an end the Parish began to see signs of recovery and renewal... and signs that we were learning to be God's people once again. Congregation numbers were recovering and it has been wonderful to welcome new people and younger families into fellowship bringing new skills, new experience and new life. There has been great joy in welcoming those who were new to the church and wider community!

### Big Changes in Personnel Au Revoir and Thank you!

It was with very heavy hearts we saw the following members of our staff and leadership team move to pastures new:

### Pioneer Curate Revd Janice Hamilton.

Janice had been part of the Parish for over 25 years with her Treasurer Musician Husband Ewen. Having first served as Youth and Children's Minister before leading the set up of the Sedbury Pioneer Project and overseeing the birth and establishment of the Sedbury Space Community Centre,

Janice was ordained in 2017. She then served as Pioneer Curate. As her curacy came to an end in the summer of 2021 Janice was appointed Community Pioneer Minister in West Cheltenham. Thank you Janice... and Ewen!

### Children and Families Minister Jane Penny.

Ethan Richards joined the Parish as Youth Co-ordinator at the beginning of 2019 and for 3 years faithfully ministered to our young people overseeing the deepening of their faith and having lots of fun! At the beginning of 2022 Ethan moved to a new post working full time with young people. Thank you Ethan!

### Administration Assistant Clare Presley.

Clare joined us as our first part time Administration Assistant in late 2018 and served us faithfully for 3 years. Clare's ministry helped the wheels of the Parish go round and in particular relieved some of the administrative burdens of staff members. Thank you Clare!

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One can never fully replace those who leave a role as each person comes with unique gifts and skills. However, we were mightily blessed to see new people enter into certain roles within the Parish.

### **Curate and Wellbeing Chaplain Revd Nicki Bullivant**

Nicki was ordained as priest at Gloucester Cathedral in June 2021 and is serving as a self-supporting curate in the Parish of Tidenham as well as the Parishes St Briavels with Hewelsfield and Brockweir.

In September 2021 Nicki was also appointed as the first Wellbeing Chaplain in the Parish for 3 days a week. Indeed, at the point of writing this, we are not aware of the existence of any other equivalent role. Bringing to the Wellbeing Chaplain role her pastoral gifts and passion for Kingdom and community, Nicki will be focusing on Post Covid Recovery, developing the newly reordered St Luke's Church as a wellbeing hub, and being Chaplain to Sedbury Space. It has been a joy and delight to see Nicki first join us to worship and then embark on a journey to ordination and the exciting new role of Wellbeing Chaplain for the Parish. Thank you Nicki.

**Children, Youth and Families Missioner Emma Durbin** 

Emma also is very familiar with the Parish of Tidenham where she has lived for many years. With Jane's departure Emma was appointed as full time CY&F Missioner.



Working with others those involved were able to identify some important action points for the Parish:

- 1. Looking to put joy, laughter and fun into our life together.
- 2. Reimagine/Restate our vision, direction and purpose.
- 3. Reforming the staff team following Janice and Jane's departure and Nicki's ordination.
- 4. Learning to be God's people once again as we gather Post Covid.

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- 5. Fresh emphasis on discipleship: Encouraging story telling, reinvigorate small groups and applying faith to the whole of life.
- 6. Clarifying/naming 1 degree shifts of change.

### Parish Development Day 2

A first Parish Day was held in March 2020 just before the Covid Pandemic hit and was the first of two days planned to consider our future as a Parish and envision our next steps together. The Diocese had kindly brought us into contact with Milly Sinclair, a leadership facilitator and spiritual director. Milly worked with us on that first day and through to the second day which finally happened on 7 October 2021.



The Day fitted in well with the Flourish Action Plan and gave us space to contemplate the massive changes that had occurred in the last couple of years and establish some priorities going forward relating to the 5 areas of our Parish Vision: Transforming Worship, Authentic Discipleship, Building up Capacity, Loving Community and Engaging Mission.

### **Tidenham Parish Church Restoration on the Cards**

Thanks to an extraordinary kind legacy from the estate of the late Tony James the Parish has been able to work towards the restoration of the Tower of St Mary and St Peter's Church, Tidenham. With the Friends of St Mary's and St Peter's also being gifted money there are also plans for the reordering and restoration of the interior of the church involving the installation of water, toilet facilities and a servery, and additional facilities in the building adjacent to the Church. These developments are not realised overnight and continue to involve an enormous amount of work with other bodies. Our thanks to Peter Gilchrist, Chair of the Friends, together with the Trustees and supporters for the massive support they continue to give the PCC. Without their help we would not be where we are today.

We would also not be where we are today without the incredible amount of work of former Chair Anne Martin who sadly died in 2022. Anne drove the Friends forward and was instrumental in bringing an impetus to the Tidenham Project. Thank you Lord for Anne!

### **Faith Development**

Central to Parish life is the discovery, development and exercising of faith in Jesus Christ. During the course of 2021 and 2022 discovery, development and exercising of faith had its challenges and its restrictions due to the Pandemic. Nevertheless here are some highlights in addition to what can be read throughout this Report.

• Roseanna and Lewis were confirmed by Bishop Robert at St Luke's in October 2022.



- Over the summer of 2022 Chantelle and Joel travelled to Brazil in partnership with Bream Parish to a YWAM Project. Whilst in Brazil Joel was baptised.

A fun highlight of 2022 for Vicar David was blessing the newly opened community pub 'The Rising Sun' in Woodcroft!


Carol singing at Café on the Hill was finally able to happen again in 2022.

### SAFEGUARDING

"Safeguarding is at the heart of our Christian faith", quotes Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury in his message at the beginning of the Church of England Parish Safeguarding Handbook. In promoting a safer church, that statement by Archbishop Welby rings true. **Everyone** has a duty of care to protect and ensure every child and adult/vulnerable adult is kept free from harm and prevent it happening in our churches.

In every case, no volunteer or paid staff can commence their role until they have provided two satisfactory references and a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check (if the role requires it).

The Child Safeguarding and Adult Safeguarding policies were reviewed in 2021 and 2022 by the Parish Safeguarding Officer and the Deputy Parish Safeguarding Officer and signed off by the PCC. They can be found on the notice boards of all three Parish churches. **Please read them and take note of the updates on legislation whether you are congregation, volunteer or paid staff.** 

**In 2021,** the Tidenham Safeguarding Team responded to one safeguarding issue, handled the immediate situation as per our procedures and successfully reported it to the necessary agencies. Pastoral care was put in place and is ongoing.

During the Covid restrictions, new volunteer applications, new paid staff and renewal of all DBS checks continued to be processed either by Zoom or in-person when restrictions eased. Safer Recruitment

procedures were adhered to at all times. Evidence checkers duly processed documents for online submission to *thirtyone:eight*, the agency that checks the submissions and forwards on to the DBS.

The Internet Watch Foundation reported that '2020 was the worst year on record for recorded instances of Online Child Sexual Abuse. The Foundation has called for more support for parents to spot dangerous websites'. They investigated 361,000 reports of suspected criminal material in 2020, in total more than its first 15 years of investigations (1996-2011).

**In 2022** 35 parish applicants were safer recruited and appointed by the PCC to work with children, young people and vulnerable adults. They were volunteers or unpaid staff, who were appointed to carry out this vital and responsible work for the parish.

### Why Is Safer Recruitment So Important?

It is the key way of protecting children, young people and all adults from harm and keeping them safe. Careful recruitment ensures this objective is reached. The House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy states that 'the church must select, and vet all those with responsibility in their roles by obtaining two satisfactory references', as well as asking the applicant to complete an online Enhanced DBS check if the role offered is eligible for and requires a police record check.

This Safer Recruitment process applies to both paid and unpaid staff (volunteers) who must also receive induction and safeguarding training before they can commence their roles. It is the PCC's duty to adhere to Safer Recruitment legislation, guidance and standards thereby ensuring good practice is carried out and records are kept up to date for all those on the Parish records.

As your PSO, I am also a point of contact and support for advice about concerns you may have for an individual (this support includes Clergy and the Pastoral Team). Together, we can refer anyone for help to the appropriate organisations confidentially.

### Health & Safety

Health and Safety as a mandatory item at every PCC meeting. There were no accidents during the year. The following items were noteworthy in 2021/22: -

- 1. The revised Health & Safety policies were formally approved by PCC on 12 October 2021.
- 2. John-Ross Henderson conducted an '*Emergency Paediatric First Aid*' course on 04 September, and a generic First Aid course on Saturday 18 September.
- 3. In September First Aid kits at Tidenham and Chase were inspected, replenished and updated. Tutshill kit was inspected and will be renewed before it expires in summer 2022.
- 4. Our first aid boxes and accident books have been relocated to the entrance to our churches to make them more accessible in the event of an emergency.
- 5. The Contract with a local certified Pest Control company continued following problems at Tutshill church with a family of grey squirrels.
- 6. Chubb made their annual inspection of all their fire extinguishers at our 3 churches in November 2021 and renewed their extinguishers in November 2022.

- 7. Problems with the new Quooker taps at Tutshill church were identified and changes made in January 2022 to reduce the problem of spitting. Advice has been given to all those who use it.
- 8. An NICEIC approved contractor performed the 5 yearly fixed wiring electrical inspections and PAT testing between 19 & 21 April 2022. Total cost of the inspections and work arising amounted to £1,206 at Chase, £196 at Tutshill and £5,007 at Tidenham. This included reinstatement of the floodlights at Tidenham and of the outside lights at both Tidenham and Chase churches.
- 9. All Church first aid kits were checked and restocked in April 2022 and a First Aid course was arranged for June.
- 10. Loose connection within an underpew heating switch at Tidenham church was repaired in October.
- 11. Two-yearly lightning conductor tests for each church were carried out in December 2022. Some follow up action required.
- 12. The runkles in Tidenham church carpets were removed by Manor Carpets in December.
- 13. Asbestos registers are located in Tidenham Church. Some follow up action will be required following a more detailed asbestos check of Tidenham church in December 2022.




### Youth, Children and Families' Ministry 2021

There were a number of changes in 2021. PCC approved the creation of a new fulltime post of 'Youth, Children and Families' (YCF) Missioner' in place of the two existing part time 3-year posts of 'Children and Families' Minister' and 'Youth Co-Ordinator', which came to an end in August 2021 and January 2022.

Following the Interview process held on 26 May 2021, PCC unanimously agreed to appoint Emma Durbin to the post, with a start date of 01 September 2021 to coincide with the start of the new school year.

- Messy church restarted at Beachley Barracks (led by Chepstow Methodist Church) We began with an overview of the Bible and are now journeying through Genesis.
- Online assemblies have been produced and shared for the major Christian festivals
- Jane Penny and Ethan Richards worked incredibly hard to ensure handover to Emma.
- Much is happening as the community emerges from Covid, but volunteers are not yet allowed into Tutshill primary school. They are allowed into Offa's Mead and Wyedean schools.
- The New Parent & Baby group run by Emma, Non, Susan Thompson, Leonie, Elaine and Margaret Pruen is going well each Tuesday in Tutshill church: 09.15-10.45am. The new longer single session is very popular. 15 to 20 parents and grandparents regularly come with babies (0-20 months).



- SPLASH has restarted in St. Luke's Room rather than Tutshill Primary School's hall due to Covid and the lack of volunteers. Numbers range from 2 – 12 reflecting the changing congregations each week. There are 6 new children so it has been nice for them to feel closer to their parents.
- Worship Without Walls (WWW) takes place on the first Sunday of each month outside Tutshill Church. This is a great opportunity to involve other members of the Church family in planning an alternative family service. Being very weather dependent it takes a break over winter.
- The Youth meet every week on a Sunday evening; on the last Sunday in the month they meet at The Bridge Church for *Sunday Night Youth* which hosts Youths from Chepstow, Tutshill, Aust and possibly further afield.
- The first lunchtime club at Wyedean School took place on 08 November. Some pupils had remembered Ethan from the Transition sessions at Tutshill school.
- Ethan thanked Janice Hamilton and Chantelle for all their assistance with the Youth activities, which on occasion amounted to 2x Zoom sessions a


week.

Youth, Children and Families' Ministry 2022

**YOUTH**- Ethan's departure from the YOUTH at the end of 2021, beginning of 2022, was a huge loss to Tidenham Parish Churches but an amazing blessing to those he now works with. I/we have missed his input, energy and naughtiness but wish him God's blessing in all that he does. Chantelle also left us to go to Uni' in Bath and is hugely missed.

'YOUTH' continues to run weekly with 6-8 young people attending regularly. We have a monthly Breakfast session at Non's (her pancakes are a blessing) and in the first half of 2022, attended the Bridge Church once a month and hosted a

joint BBQ and Games night. However, after joining with two Forest of Dean Church Youth groups for the Summer Limitless Festival 2022 (Thankyou Non & Ethan for taking them), good friendships were made, and the Youth opted to join up with them in the second half of the year.

Joel & Chantelle joined with the Bream Youth for a Mission trip to Brazil in July/ August. They had a fantastic time and shared their experiences with the Church on their return. Jacob asked to do a preach, which he did in October in a Family worship service. This has led to Lewis doing the Christingle talk and Sam also wanting to preach. Zanna & Zach are playing in the band led by Jonno. Zanna & Lewis also got confirmed in a wonderful service led by the Bishop. We are also blessed to have Eve & Joel's offer to remain in Youth by being Helpers.

CHILDREN'S WORK, SPLASH- continues to see 8-15 children attending with ages ranging from 3-12 years old. We continue to use St. Luke's room though that is constantly under review. We have been blessed with enough volunteers to cover SPLASH and CRECHE, though would need more if we are to move back into the school.

At the beginning of the Summer we offered a family activity day (canoeing down the Wye) and BBQ and camp over at Botany Bay, Tintern. We didn't have many attend but a great time was had by those who made it. We also chose one of the hottest days of the year to hold a Family picnic with Bouncy castle and games as part of the Jubilee Celebrations. Again, attendance from the Church community was low (understandably so) but we did have parents from our community groups attend which was fantastic.



FAMILY WORSHIP- Has evolved from outside (Worship Without Walls) to inside because of the nature of the services. It is great to see new members of the church being happy to lead Worship and especially exciting to have the Youth lead parts of the service.

**COMMUNITY & MISSION** – THE NEW PARENT & BABY GROUP evolved into Tutshill Baby & Toddlers (BATS). We have an amazing team who continue to serve and support the parents and grandparents who attend with a smile, listening ear and offer of a cuppa.

SEDBURY STAY & PLAY continues to thrive on a Wednesday. We have had a change of wonderful



volunteers and regularly see 15 parents with 20 children attend. At Christmas we were delighted to welcome 'Father Lee & Tudor Christmas's' to our Christmas parties. Christingles were also held at both groups.

We have partnered with SPORTILY, TIDENHAM PARISH COUNCIL & SEDBURY SPACE by jointly running a host of events throughout the year. At Easter an Easter Egg hunt and Sportily session in Sedbury for Families and children.

Throughout the Summer holidays we provided free sessions for Children, Youth & Families in

Tidenham Parish, such as the cinema, climbing, mosaic making, editing and 4 Sportily sessions in Sedbury & Tutshill. At Christmas a free Session at Whirlikidz with food and Father Christmas was also offered with 35 children attending.

We are also supporting a group of mums in Sedbury who are fundraising to take children on a Summer trip. We supported them running a Summer fete and Carols in the Legion at Christmas. Building these relationships in the community and partnering with other organisations, I hope will break down barriers and is part of our vision of 'loving community and engaging mission'.

The St Marten's Lantern Walk culminated in 60+ parents and children ending the walk with hot drinks and nibbles in St. Luke's.

THE SCARECROW TRAIL as always was a huge success with approx. 340 quiz sheets being sold and 1000 + people participating in the trail. 80% of money raised went towards the building maintenance fund for Tidenham Parish Churches, with the rest being split between SARA (Severn Area Rescue Association) and TIC (Teens In Crisis). We are indebted to all of those in the local community who put in time & money when creating the Scarecrows, plus the volunteers who help make it all run smoothly. Without them, this event could not happen.

SCHOOL WORK- TUTSHILL PRIMARY SCHOOL attend St. Luke's every other Friday for a whole school assembly. A small group of YR5s and 6s makes up a Worship team and take an active role in leading Worship during these services. The school held a Harvest and Christmas service with parents invited to attend and are proactive in looking for Church involvement in their school community.

OFFA'S MEAD PRIMARY SCHOOL- Have welcomed us in once a month to run a short assembly which is sometimes attended by the whole school or just KS1. Thank you to Polly for all of her help and support.

ST. JOHN'S, DEAN CLOSE- continue to worship at St. Luke's approx. every 6 weeks with Fiona leading the services. Thankyou Fiona.

We held Christingle services for all three schools with 360+ children receiving a Christingle orange and hearing the Christingle message.

Lastly, THANKYOU to all of the volunteers who give of their time. This work is not one person but many people who are making a difference in the lives of all they touch. Thank you to all of those that pray for the Children, Youth & Families and a special **Thank you must also go to Non Van den Braak who tirelessly works alongside me.** 

### Parish Scarecrow Trail 2021

Revd Janice Hamilton originally started The Scarecrow Trail as a fund raising community event for a new roof for Tutshill church, but it quickly became a fun thing for many families to complete during the Easter holidays. The Trail starts at the Lifestyle Express Shop in Beachley Road, and moves round the village before ending at St. Luke's Church, Tutshill.

Following the lifting of the Government's Covid restrictions the PCC was very keen to reinstate the Easter Trail, whose theme this year was Disney Films. It was great to see whole families coming together over the Easter holiday period - to have fun walking around our streets and enjoying themselves, exercising and talking about the good quality of the 31 scarecrows created by volunteers and located at various gardens and public places throughout the village.

We had a very good response this year considering we didn't advertise in Wales as they still had COVID -19 restrictions in place. 436 Scarecrow Trail maps were sold. £1310.35 was collected in total: - £ 1121.85 in cash and £186.15 from text payments – the first time we have used that facility. 10% was given to each of two local charities as decided by the organising team – Winston's Wish and SARA.

As always, our thanks go to all the imaginative scarecrow creators and the hosts without whom this event would not happen.

We owe a big debt of gratitude to the 2021 organising team that consisted of Carol & Richard Clammer, Sarah Lewis, Jane Penny, Susan Riordan and Melanie Walton, and to all the staff at The Lifestyle Express Shop Tutshill who sold the maps and sheets and gave us exactly the right money for them.

Foundation Governor links to Tutshill CoE Primary School

It is the role of Foundation Governors to forge and maintain links between a church school, church and the community, as well as serving on the Full Governing Body Committee of the School and other committees. For Church schools, it is important that the values of the school speak to all of the love of God.

"Love One Another, Know Ourselves, Believe and Grow" is the mission statement of Tutshill School. The church and the school's vision is to work together and reach out to one another and the wider community.

2022 saw a time of significant change in the management structure of Tutshill CoE Primary School. In early 2022 The Governing Boards of Tutshill CofE Primary School and Woolaston Primary School launched a consultation on their proposal to federate from **Monday, 6th June 2022**, as **Forest Edge Federation**. This was a decision reached by both Governing Boards at duly constituted Governing Board meetings to discuss the federation on 4th October 2021 for Tutshill CofE Primary School and 15th July 2021 for Woolaston Primary School.

Tidenham PCC had 3 foundation governor spaces on the governing Board of Tutshill school: Vicar David was one, and there were two vacancies. Tidenham PCC now has 2 foundation governor spaces on the new governing Board of Forest Edge Federation. Vicar David is one, and the PCC recommended to the Bishop of Gloucester that Nataline Bennett-Coleman be appointed the second foundation governor. This was duly authorised on 22 September 2022, with her term of office from 01 July 2022 – 30 June 2026.

Our Foundation Governors support the school well and aim to maintain links between the school whether it be via Splash, Junior Church or being in class, or links within the parish and the community.

The School's Friday Collective Worship (Assemblies in old money) held in St. Luke's church Tutshill continues to be a really important part of School and Church life.

### **Pastoral Visiting Team**

Tidenham Parish Pastoral Visiting Team is made up of members from the churches in the Parish. We are a small team that contacts and visits people in the Parish. This might be because they are unwell, unable to get to church or needing some support. Our hope is that people who are feeling disconnected due to their circumstances still feel part of the church. For those in hospital, we are also able to arrange visits from the hospital Chaplains who visit on our behalf.

Pastoral visiting was affected by the Covid Pandemic, at times restricting the team's ability to visit people in person, but we have been keeping in touch with those needing pastoral support by phone, email and letter where we can, and have continued to refer to Hospital Chaplains those who admitted to hospital.

As we began to emerge from Covid in 2022 a group of us have been looking at reshaping our Pastoral Care in the Parish taking into account how much the pastoral landscape has changed, not only through Covid, but also since the Team was set up around 10 years ago. There have been personnel changes over that time and both the Wellbeing Project the Children, Youth and Families Project provide pastoral care, as do the weekly and monthly groups and activities in the church and wider community. A new structure will try to draw all things pastoral together with the same aim of ensuring that people are in receipt of pastoral care within, around and beyond our church family. Whilst new Pastoral Visitors have also been identified to join the Team, we hope to see the whole church being encouraged to have a pastoral heart.

If you, or someone you know, would be helped by our support, then please do let us know. You can speak to Julia, Kathryn, Revd David, Revd Nicki, Polly or Pete. Please pray for all those engaged in pastoral care within the life of the church and our partners within the wider community, that we may bring the light of Christ to those in need.

### Reordering of St Luke's Church

The faculty for St Luke's re-ordering had a completion date of September 2020, but due to a hold up initially in communication from the Deputy Chancellor following submission of further documents to meet conditions, as well as to lack of funds and latterly, COVID-19 restrictions, we were unable to complete it all in time. We have asked the Chancellor for an extension.

The working party (including Revd David, James Parsons, Tanya White and Churchwardens Nicholette Flatman and Prof Brian Duerden) was keen to progress the works and move to the next phase of installing a servery, with the final phase comprising sound desk, new internal glazed door and presentation

equipment to follow soon after.

Having secured a further grant of £4,900 from Barnwood Trust and additional private donations by the end of 2020 towards the servery, CYMRU Kitchens began 3 weeks' work on the servery on Monday 26 April 2021. This was finished on time.

The existing dark wooden entrance door will stand open permanently. New internal glass

doors to match the outside doors were proposed, but after consulting with specialists it was concluded that the new internal glass doors would be impractical.

Following receipt of a £5k donation, the Group engaged local craftsman and



church member Dave Ransom to design and build a sound desk and book trolley to match the servery. This will satisfy Bill White's concerns as set out in his report to PCC following Revd Steve Morris' July 2020 site visit. The design was approved by DAC and work was completed in January 2022.

We are still in discussion with the DAC re the use of drop down screens with projectors or TV monitors.

Fairtrade in Tidenham Parish

Tidenham Parish is a Fairtrade Parish and as such serve Fairtrade refreshments after services and at other meetings and events. In Autumn 2021 Traidcraft catalogues were safely distributed in order to enable members and neighbours to buy Fairtrade gifts for family and friends. All orders were entered into a prize draw. Linda Wilson won a Fairtrade hamper and Jean Burgum won a runner-up small hamper. We will continue as a Fairtrade Parish doing what we can to ensure producers can earn an income during, and beyond, the Covid pandemic.

In 2022 we successfully renewed our status as a Fairtrade Parish, as our existing 2-year certificates for each church all expired in April. The new certificates have been posted on church notice boards.

We were all very sad to hear that Traidcraft went into administration in January 2023, as that was our major supplier of Fairtrade goods. We are therefore looking into other sources of our Fairtrade supplies.

*Traidcraft Exchange* became *Transform Trade* in September 2022 and is still in business!

### The Link Parish Magazine 2022

The Link Magazine has recently been produced in quarterly editions. This has been printed by Mike Scott at Stow Park Printers in Newport for many years and following Mike's retirement in 2022 is now printed by Parish Magazine Printing in Devon.

We currently have 23 local advertisers in the Link Magazine, well co-oriented by Roger Martin. We have a print run of 400 copies with a colour cover (see left) and a black and white inside publication of 54 pages, together with a single black and white A4 sheet Prayer Diary written by Margaret Coombs.

The last price at Stow Park amounted to £288 per edition and the new printer's cost is £353. In a recent telephone conversation with our new printer, they indicated that they may need to increase Link printing cost by 10% later in 2023, but this is not certain.

We have 250 paying subscribers who pay £5,00/year, plus further copies are distributed free of charge to Schools, Care Home, Doctor's Surgeries etc, with individual Link magazines priced at £1.50. These are available in our Parish Church buildings for visitors.

### **PIONEER PROJECT**

I was ordained in July 2017 and have since been a curate in this parish serving as a Community Minister with a particular focus on Sedbury. The main endeavour of that ministry has been working with local residents to develop a community centre known as 'Sedbury Space' to encourage participation and volunteering thereby contributing to community and individual wellbeing. In the latter stages of my curacy, with a small team of people I launched a fresh expression of church, called 'The Well'. This was a monthly drop -in style of church based in Sedbury Space. Sadly before it had a chance to grow and flourish we were thrown into turmoil by the pandemic and the ensuing national lockdown.

Knowing that my curacy would come to an end in June 2021, I've been thinking of succession planning. Experience shows that pioneer projects and fresh expressions often collapse when the founder leader moves on. The main focus of my prayers has been that God would raise up others to take on the different aspects of ministry that I've started.

I've been wearing three 'hats', each of which requires a different plan to secure the future.

**First of all**, a key part of my role has been managing Sedbury Space. This had become increasingly time consuming and for the charity to grow and become established would require more dedicated management. With a lottery grant we were able to recruit a Centre Manager and last year Susan Riordan took up this post – just as COVID lockdown was enforced!

**The second 'hat'** has been as Chair of Trustees at Sedbury Space. I'm really pleased that Lee Durbin, a teacher at Wyedean School, has stepped up and is preparing to take on this role from the next AGM.

**The third 'hat'** is that of Chaplain to Sedbury Space and to the wider community. Although Sedbury Space is a community centre serving people of all faiths and none, I have been able to offer a listening ear and prayerful support at times of crisis and celebration which has been valued by many, regardless of faith. The new part-time community Wellbeing Chaplain Revd Nicki Bullivant now wears this 'hat'.

### The Parish Folk Club 2021 / 2022

St Luke's Folk Club meetings restarted in November 2021 after a long break during the height of the Covid pandemic and have continued every month or two throughout 2022. We meet in the refurbished main body of the church to take advantage of the warmth, space, excellent acoustics and comfortable chairs. Doors open at 17:30, though the club proper starts at 18:00 and concludes around 20:30. It continues to be hosted and run by Bill and Tanya White and we provide tea and coffee, but no longer food (nibbles) and other drinks because of the workload and health issues.

Attendance varies but we get about 20-25 on average which includes young and old with varying degrees of experience. We provide a safe venue for performers to try out their skills in playing, singing and song-writing in a safe, low pressure environment.

Although some regular members have moved away, new people turn up from time to time having heard of us by word of mouth or via social media. Often, different performers will 'jam' together and invite the



audience to join in with well-known choruses.

The Open Mic performances range from poetry to folk music, both sung and instrumental.

Music is a varied mix of classical guitar instrumentals, British and American folk songs - traditional and contemporary, together with acoustic covers of more modern music genres.

Licencing for playing live, non-worship music is covered by St Luke's CCL and PRS music licences. Costs for the use of the church are paid for by the organisers and those attending are asked for donations help cover these - which they usually do.

#### 2021 Report

With the easing of Covid restrictions, regular practice sessions on Tuesdays have begun again with much enthusiasm. There are usually between 10 and 12 people at each session. On most evenings, we are joined by ringers from Lydney, Alvington and Chepstow and with added numbers we have made good progress in learning new methods and techniques.

Although towers are meeting again in person, the online ringing sessions continue. The Ringing Room meets online on Sunday evenings and is still popular with many ringers. As well as regular ringing sessions, annual online competitions take place between towers. David and Joyce Burr, and Mary and Howard Murphy were part of two successful teams, winning the Croome Trophy and coming second in the Penn Trophy.

Before the Covid restrictions we occasionally received requests from ringing groups and towers in other parts of the country wishing to ring at Tidenham Tower. Happily, this has started up again and we have had two groups this year with another band due in May.

Over the past year we have rung at weddings as well as Sunday services, Christmas services and other events. To mark the death of HRH Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh on 9 April, Howard Murphy tolled the tenor bell 99 times on Saturday 10 April at 1200 noon with Mary checking the count.

#### 2022 Report

Bellringing in all Forest Towers are now ringing as normal with a practice night each week. The practice night for Tidenham Tower is Tuesday from 7.30pm to 9pm. There are a wide range of ages from octogenarians to teenagers and anyone wishing to join us and learn the art of bellringing are most welcome.

Although we don't regularly ring for the Sunday services, Howard Murphy tolls the tenor bell for about 15 minutes before the start of each 9am service. We do ring all 6 bells for services such as Nine Lessons and Carols and also for weddings and other special occasions. On 19<sup>th</sup> September at 12 noon, Howard rang the tenor bell 96 times in memory of the late Queen Elizabeth II.

Each year at Tidenham we have an evening of Branch Ringing whereby ringers from all other towers in the Branch join us for an evening of bellringing. This year it will be held on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> February from 7pm to 9pm. It is always a most enjoyable occasion.

In October 2022, a group of young people from Tutshill Church Youth joined us together with Emma Durbin and John Ross Henderson for an introduction to bellringing. They all did brilliantly. First they had a go at chiming and then graduated to actually ringing the bell, all under the supervision of experienced ringers.

Forest South (FS) Deanery Synod

#### What is a Deanery Synod?

Deaneries are groups of Anglican parishes in a geographical area. The size of the area and the number of parishes varies widely. Led by an Area Dean, Deaneries have a crucial role in linking our worshipping communities together and integrating us all into the wider diocese, of which we are a part. Deanery Synods are formal meetings for conversation, discussion and decision making on matters relating to mission and ministry, not just in the local area, but also diocesan-wide. They can raise or support motions which can be taken to the Diocesan Synod for consideration in the life of the whole diocese.

Deanery Synods (DS) exist to serve the witness and mission of the wider church and so need to be able to take strategic decisions to advance mission and ministry in the deanery and diocese.

- DS usually meets three or four times a year, but FS DS only met twice in 2022 (March and October).
- It is important that the synod reflects the diversity of the congregations, in gender, ethnic origin, age and experience
- In Gloucester Diocese, each Deanery is given a corporate budget for its parish shares. Each parish is then requested to meet its financial obligation (its parish share) based on, among other things, the size of its church electoral roll, its usual Sunday service attendance and the number of its paid staff. This basis is being reviewed but, as yet, there is no information as to what this may be.
- James Parsons became the Deanery Synod Treasurer during the summer of 2021.

### Who are on the Deanery Synods and How are they Elected?

The size of a deanery synod will depend on the size of the deanery, but will vary between 50 and 150 people. All licensed clergy in the deanery are automatically members of the deanery synod. However, every three years, lay members (those that are not clergy) are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). These meetings are open to all members on the church electoral roll. The number of people elected in each parish is determined by size of the church electoral roll.

**Deanery Strategic LIFE Plan?** The Deanery (as are all Deaneries in our Diocese) is preparing a working document which proposes a plan to meet the needs of the people and communities which the church in our deanery serves. There was little progress during 2021 due to Covid, but during 2022, with the support of a consultant (appointed by the Diocese), progress is being made.

#### Why is a Strategic Plan being drawn up?

The Diocese and Deanery want to plan how we can best serve this diocese in 10 years' time. For example, are the current boundaries, buildings, staffing and lay leadership suitable for the next decade and beyond? This process strengthens the role of our deaneries in planning creatively and strategically for our future as a varied and sustainable church across the diocese of Gloucester.

The Diocese cannot continue 'getting by' on its reserves and carrying on as we are. All Deaneries are therefore being encouraged to think creatively about whether they are meeting the needs of their communities. One suggestion is that the Deanery may consider starting new worshipping communities, creating festival churches, and financing new ministries in chaplaincy, pioneering, sports ministry, children and youth work and administration in the deanery.

**Area Dean** The Vicar of Bream, Revd Chris Maclay, led FSD for several years, but he decided to step down as of Easter 2022, (when he also decided to move on from Bream). In the absence of a new Area Dean the role was covered by the Archdeacon of Gloucester, the Venerable Hilary Dawson.

#### Tidenham Parish PCC Annual Report 2021 / 2022

Churches Together (Cytun)

Nine Churches or Parishes are members of Cytûn and all but two of them, (Tidenham Parish and Stoat Evangelical Church) are in Wales. Cytûn suspended business meetings during COVID-19. However, the Food Bank and CAP services continued to operate, albeit in altered format, meeting the needs of many in our district. There was also a regular provision of morning prayer via Zoom during the lockdowns to which all were welcome.

#### **Chepstow Foodbank**

Chepstow Foodbank is run in partnership with local churches, facilitated by Chepstow and District Churches Together. It is a registered charity set up in February 2013 No. 1151076

The foodbank has continued to feed people from two distribution centres in 2021. It is open every Wednesday at The Bridge Church and every Friday at Chepstow Baptist Church. We currently have 20 volunteers. Sadly, some volunteers decided not to come back to volunteer after the lifting of the Covid 19 restrictions.

During 2021, we fed 1175 people with 334 being children under the age of 16. 11% of the people we fed during the year came from Tidenham ward.

Due to the high number of food and financial donations, we have been able to give everyone referred to the foodbank essential toiletries and additional food items alongside the food parcel.

During 2021, we saw an increase in the number of people referred to the foodbank due to homelessness with 10% of clients living in temporary accommodation.

We are so thankful to our wonderful volunteers and the many people who donate food on a regular basis enabling us to support people facing emergency and crisis situations meaning they are unable to buy food.

### Chepstow and District Christians Against Poverty (CAP) Debt Centre

The Chepstow and District CAP centre which started in 2014 is run in partnership with Chepstow Churches Together and gives free debt help and counselling to anyone who feels weighed down by debt. It continued to operate through the Coronavirus Pandemic, helping many clients become debt free.

The Debt Centre Manager David Price writes :

"Since we started we have helped over 113 families who didn't know where to turn. We have seen 25 of these families go DEBT FREE. Over this last year working with the charity <u>ACTS435.com</u>, we have been able to raise £650 and have been able to buy a cooker, school uniforms, clothes, and the fee for Debt Relief Orders (DROs). Through CAP's emergency aid fund, we have also been able to help families with over £400 worth of grocery shopping, where we can buy fresh fruit and vegetables to complement foodbank parcels.

We are always looking for people to help us, the best way to do this is through our monthly prayer letter, and you can sign up using this link <u>http://eepurl.com/hlKXgL</u>.

We also offer the CAP Money course, a short course that teaches participants to Budget, Save & Spend, the course material at the moment is going through a major update, for more information on the course either to attend or perhaps run your own please visit <u>https://capmoney.org/</u>

### Update for 2021

Sadly the COVID-19 Pandemic has continued to make fundraising and volunteer activities difficult over the past year. The Friends were however able to hold their AGM in Tidenham Church on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> July 2022 and the Christmas Trees event returned, opening with a well-attended Concert on 17<sup>th</sup> December 2020.

During the year, work on the carpark included some resurfacing, covering the light bases and most recently, volunteers planted a hedge above the top fence line.

We are also grateful to those members who have been doing tremendous work clearing the graves in the churchyard over the past two years. As well as improving the look of the churchyard, it is now possible to read inscriptions on gravestones previously completely obscured by vegetation.

### Update for 2022

2022 was another year that got off to a quiet start due to Covid and then in April our first Chairman, Anne Martin, sadly died while on holiday at her home in France; she did a fantastic job in getting the charity established and we all miss her enthusiasm and drive.

The Friends were able to support the PCC's Jubilee celebrations over the weekend of 16<sup>th</sup>/17<sup>th</sup> June. With flower arrangements and refreshments, Tidenham Church was a place to sit and enjoy the hot afternoon of music in a pleasantly cool and beautiful environment. The AGM was held in Tidenham Church on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> December 2022 and the Christmas Trees event, with more visitors than in previous years, opened with a Concert on 16<sup>th</sup> December 2023.

The Friends are trying to purchase the building just outside the upper Lych Gate; they now have planning permission for the conversion and we have



lawyers working on the purchase. If all goes well the building will be known as the Tony James Memorial Building, in memory of a former churchwarden who worshipped in Tidenham and whose estate has generously made the purchase of the building and its renovation possible. The plans for the North Aisle are now mature and we hope to get approval for the works later this year.
