Welcome to the Parishes of Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut, St Briavels, and Hewelsfield and Brockweir, a unique set-up of sister Benefices in the Forest Deanery, at the southwestern tip of Gloucester Diocese, with three Parishes and five active Churches. Our congregations are an eclectic group of God's people, where everyone is welcome.

The Parishes enjoy a broad range of worshipping styles, with a range of traditional and contemporary worship, sung Eucharists, traditional and modern hymns. In addition to hymn books we have a bespoke song book and use audio visual aids. Our worship includes lay leaders and both Eastward and Westward facing celebrations and our ministry team and congregations work together in mutual respect and love.

For over 10 years, our three Parishes have paid their full Parish share. We have a sound financial base on which to grow. You can see more information in our annual reports.

We are looking for someone to lead us who is deeply prayerful, a challenging, collaborative thinker and worker, able to hold differences in unity, with a heart for mission and community, a passion for Jesus Christ and developing His Kingdom in this beautiful part of the world.

Our new Incumbent will will be based in Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut as Vicar and also have oversight of St Briavels with Hewelsfield and Brockweir as Priest in Charge. They will also be an active member of Gloucester Diocese and Forest Deanery, shaping future strategy.

The Vicar will be supported by an Associate Priest, an Ordained Local Minister, two Lay Readers, three Licensed Pastoral Visitors, a Licensed Funeral Minister and four PTO Priests.

Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut

Our Parish is within the beautiful Wye Valley Area of Natural Beauty and borders the historic Forest of Dean to the north and Chepstow in Wales to the south. Each Parish village has its own identity and life, ranging from more rural communities to suburban villages and an army camp in Beachley. The population of the Parish was c.6,000 in the last census of 2021, with significant growth seen since through the addition of new housing. Worshippers also travel to our Parish from Chepstow and the surrounding areas.

We have Churches in Tidenham, Tidenham Chase and Tutshill with congregations of c.25, c.7—15, and 50—80 adults with c.20 youth and children respectively. For special services, we get significantly higher attendance. Worship events take place in Sedbury Space, a community centre serving Sedbury, which has opportunities to grow God's Kingdom and meet social and spiritual need. The Parish also contains the redundant church of St John, Beachley and the ruins of the church of St James, Lancaut.


Our vision is 'Living life together in the flow of God's love', meaning we feel called to build strong and honest relationships: with the God who made us, loves us and calls us; with each other in the Christian community; with the places where we live and work; and with the wider world. Our mission takes us out into the local areas, as well as bringing people into our church buildings to help build the Kingdom of God in Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut.

We have strong links with local schools and other community and civil organisations within the Parish and the ancient town of Chepstow.

It was so refreshing on that first visit to worship at St Luke, Tutshill, that there was no sense of any particular churchmanship — just a group of people who clearly loved God and evidently loved their neighbour — and, to a now PTO priest, a delight to be one of FIVE who have chosen to serve in this Parish.

St Briavels

St Briavels is an historic Parish in the Forest of Dean, near the Welsh border and Offa's Dyke. The village comprises families with roots firmly established, younger families with children and retired people. Many of the latter two groups have moved into the village from elsewhere. The Parish Council estimate that approximately 60% of the population are aged 55 or over. The population of the village was c.1,300 in the last census. The village also has a growing Voluntary Aided Church of England Primary School, a Congregational Chapel, a doctors' surgery, a pub and a local shop. The village has a recreation ground with tennis courts and meeting / social event and club facilities at the Pavilion and Assembly Rooms.

The Church is in the heart of the village next to the mediaeval castle and open daily. Worship is traditional and the main Sunday service is sung Eucharist from Common Worship, supplemented by mid-week services and prayer. The main Sunday service attracts around 15 worshippers, while festivals bring around 40. A committed and faithful Ordained Local Minister leads the Parish and the congregation is familiar with different styles of worship.

The village retains a deep sense of history and community, for example on the Day of Pentecost the Church moves outside to hear an invited priest earn 'The Whittington Purse' by delivering a sermon to the assembled crowd (usually more than one hundred) awaiting the 'Bread and Cheese Ceremony'. Bread and cheese are thrown from the Pound wall to local 'Dole Claimers'.

Hewelsfield and Brockweir


This rural Parish has approximately 450 residents in two villages and dispersed properties. The community is a blend of local families often with agricultural roots, and many newer residents, including professionals and small business owners. This combination brings diverse perspectives and a shared love of the countryside, creating a close-knit and supportive community.

There are c.18 regular attendees in the congregation, led by a faithful and dedicated Reader. Hospitality is a of treasured aspect our Church community, with gatherings centred around food being a vital way to connect and strengthen bonds. These occasions, whether following services or during special events, allow Parishioners and newcomers alike to share in fellowship, good conversation and the timeless sense of community that food often brings. We provide 24-hour access to our well-used Little Larder.

St Mary Magdalene is at the far edge of the Parish. There is a thriving village shop and nearby hall that serve as central gathering places. St Mary Magdalene's congregation are also actively involved in local societies, such as the history, amateur dramatics and gardening clubs, building links between church life and village activities. Through these connections, our church extends its reach, relevance and welcome within the broader community.

Forest Deanery

These are exciting times for the Forest Deanery. As our Deanery Strategic Plan, which we have been working on for some time, begins to work toward implementation, we are already beginning to see a real enthusiasm for working more collaboratively, as the body of Christ across this beautiful part of the diocese. We want to appoint someone who will be excited about working with lay and ordained colleagues within the Benefices and across the deanery, and who will appreciate the support that such collaboration offers.

Our deanery plan is made up of four main pillars: Local Ministry, Youth Ministry, Buildings (including Church Offices) and Training (including Support and Administration). Each pillar is led by a member of the team and work within each area is focused deanery wide, as we all look to walk together as brothers and sisters in Christ.

As part of this we are also looking to appoint two interim ministers within the deanery who will be working collaboratively across Benefices, together with our Diocesan Senior Interim Minister Reverend Ali Mepham. This important work will look at how we best establish effective ministry teams across the deanery, in a way that is sustainable and life giving for our clergy; together with support from developing Local Ministers (lay and ordained) in the Parishes. With our Youth (and Children's) Ministry work, greater support for our officers and how we care for our buildings, we hope to enable a deanery that is able to grow as fruitful branches of the vine. This is a big task, but also a unique opportunity and so with prayer, attentiveness to what we are being called to, we travel in hope.

Our Wellbeing Ministry

Our Wellbeing Ministry, funded by donations and grants, seeks to meet the diverse needs of individuals by offering holistic support and encouraging connection, belonging and purpose to promote mental, physical and spiritual healing within our community. The ministry is led by our part time Wellbeing Chaplain (whose balance of time is spent as an Associate Priest), with support from the part time Children, Youth and Families Minister. The Ministry partners with local social services, health providers, schools and charities such as Christians Against Poverty in our parish and the town of Chepstow.

We provide a Chaplaincy Chat Room, community meals, a café, Bible Study, a baby and toddler group and support groups for cancer and bereavement at Sedbury Space. Following the reordering of St Luke, Tutshill, the Church is used for wellbeing activities, such as a Little Larder foodbank and gatherings for children, youth and families, including a parent and toddler group. Additional offerings include mindfulness courses, Pilates and a men's group. These activities are designed to build relationships, foster community

and explore the Christian faith in a sensitive, inclusive way.

By creating opportunities for connection and support, the ministry aims to foster wholeness and bring life to our community, ensuring that individuals experience wellbeing in all aspects of their lives.

Many of our regular attendees have been introduced to Sedbury Space's provision by Reverend Nicki through her liaison work with local GP surgeries. The doctors appreciate that for some people meeting others, usually in smaller groups and on their own terms, can benefit their health, reduce their need to see a GP and offer a range of opportunities. This links to mission and faith development via one-to-one confidential sessions in the weekly **Chaplaincy Chatroom, the Bible Study** group and the drop-in café through to an introduction to worship. This work has identified the benefit of activities to address aspects of the mental health needs of adults and in some cases, children.

Children, Youth and Families Ministry (CYFM)

Children, youth and families are a priority in our Parishes.

Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut

The Parish employs a part time Children, Youth and Families Minister who works with the ministry team and volunteers to nurture our younger members and families in the Christian faith. They build relationship within the Church and wider community and encourage and grow faith working with schools, toddler groups, children, youth and families.

We have thriving baby and toddler groups that are a key part of the Wellbeing Ministry. A 30+ strong volunteer team of CYFM volunteers supports Church and community events, for example the annual St Martin's Lantern Walk and Scarecrow Trail in Tutshill.

We enjoy seeing our young people immersed in the love of God, for them to grow in personal faith and use their faith in everyday life. We are also committed to supporting families as they juggle the demands of daily life. Our young people are playing their part in the life and worship of the Church and are encouraged to progress

through dedication, baptism, first Holy Communion and Confirmation. We also have close links to other Churches and youth groups in Chepstow and the Forest Deanery, which provide Mission opportunities abroad for teens and social gatherings locally.

St Luke, Tutshill has youth worship, an active Sunday School (SPLASH), with crèche facilities for the very young and a very well attended Family Service once a month. The children from Tutshill C of E primary school hold bi-weekly assemblies at St Luke. Both Tutshill and St John's schools hold special services such as leavers, Remembrance, Christmas and Easter at St Luke.

St Briavels, and Hewelsfield and Brockweir

Children and families are welcomed and children's corners provided in each Church. The children from St Briavels C of E primary school hold special services at St Mary the Virgin, similar to those at Tutshill. We are focused on attracting younger congregational members wherever possible. The Vicar and Priest in Charge will have the opportunity to be a governor in Tutshill and St Briavels C of E schools.

Our strengths and opportunities

St Briavels

Strengths -

The Parish has a strong sense of community, with many church members involved in local village activities. Special events like the open-air service on Good Friday (jointly with the Congregational Chapel), the Whittington Purse sermon and the 'Bread and Cheese Ceremony' are highlights that bring people together. The Church maintains close ties with the local C of E VA primary school, which recently received a "Good" OFSTED rating. The Church family is welcoming, with a diverse congregation and is seen as a central part of the community, if only for some at the times of major festivals or significant life events. The church building is open daily, and being directly opposite the castle (now a youth hostel) attracts many visitors. There is an excellent team of PTOs supporting the ordained local minister.

Opportunities —

We strive to 'Sing the Lord's song in a strange land.' We have an opportunity to reach out to new families who move into the area, to reach out to the community within and around the village and to our many visitors as we try to grow God's Kingdom here in St Briavels. We also try to encourage more use of our Church building for events. We undertake fund-raising/grant applications to fund future mission work, building maintenance and upkeep of valuable assets like the historic organ.

Hewelsfield and Brockweir

Strengths —

The Church community extends a warm welcome to existing and new people and St Mary Magdalene is open daily for all who seek reflection and prayer. There is a strong sense of teamwork among the congregation (including a few young families), especially during events. A fun and inclusive atmosphere allows people to accept each other's differences. Volunteers read lessons and lead intercessions and there is a singing group. Tea, coffee and cake are served each Sunday and many members are actively involved in the local community, volunteering in the shop and participating in leisure activities.

Opportunities ————

We have an opportunity to reach out to more of the gathered community across the Parish, especially young families, to grow God's Kingdom. We could also fund-raise for better heating and to fulfil the recommendations of the last quinquennial report. We have a project to add a servery that needs completing.

Your new home and the surrounding area

Our Parishes sit adjacent to the Wye Valley Area of Natural Beauty and the Forest of Dean. There are rural and suburban elements of the area, with close proximity to Chepstow. Excellent road and rail transport links and a variety of shops, restaurants, pubs and cafes, make it a vibrant town. There are good local schools.

The house which will be provided for the new incumbent is a modern, comfortable and spacious private family home. There are a number of other buildings in our parishes where meetings and events will be comfortably hosted, including a new parish office, with meeting, toilet and kitchen facilities. The Diocesan Board of Finance is working through the planning stages of building a bespoke vicarage, which is anticipated to complete during the tenure of our next incumbent, who will then have the option of moving into the new vicarage, or remaining in the existing house.

Tutshill is a family friendly village with a C of E primary school, a private school and a nearby academy trust comprising a primary and secondary school. It has a village shop, a GP practice, a butcher's shop, a busy cafe, a hairdresser and a community-run pub.

Local travel will be required within the Parishes, the bounds of which lie within a 20-minute drive of the vicarage. Travel will also be required within the Forest Deanery and to Gloucester.
