#### **PART ONE...Showing Up**

This week we're thinking again about 'being worshipful'. Last week Tom took us through WHY we worship. In a nutshell, it's our response to God's saving love, grace and power. It's our reaction to being loved completely, forgiven utterly and known through and through. It's also, Tom said, because God is worth it! You could say worship is all about worth-ship...the Lord's worth.

In Psalm 66, we hear again the story of the miraculous Crossing of the Red Sea, as a whole nation of enslaved people escaped to freedom through God's intervention. It's no wonder they danced and sang and worshipped.

But let's be honest here. If I were to have a report card delivered summarising how well I've managed to worship during the last months of being church scattered because of lock-down, I think the honest comment would be: 'Could do better.'

Now my first reaction is to scramble for an excuse. It's not so easy to be worshipful on my own... I know there's online services and Zoom meetings....but it's just not the same!

No, it not been 'the same', but it is what it is. God's worth-ship hasn't changed. I know, deep down...I could have done an awful lot better, worship-wise.

One Christian writer has put it rather neatly. He says: 'Show up! Shut up! Look up!'

Show up! That's what I need to do, when I worship. When we worship.

It's showing up in church, if and when we can. It's showing up on-line if we're tech-savvy.

It's showing up, on my own, day by day, to spend a quiet time-out with God...be it for ten minutes or twenty or an hour. It's about putting God first over all the other things that call for my attention. Because He's worth it. And because I really need to stop putting myself at the centre of my world and make sure that it's the Lord on the throne of my heart. It's about making sure my spiritual compass is properly aligned with the Lord Jesus, my true North. And I do this by showing up and worshipping.

It's about letting go of the busy-ness, the unimportant things and even the important things that consume us, just to be with God for a time. Letting go, to readjust our spiritual focus and to regain a right perspective on things. It's about allowing Jesus to ask us each time we come to worship: Who do you say I am? and then responding honestly and openly. It may even be that we have to admit that we have found it difficult to allot time to Him or give Him space in our busy schedule and that we really need to readjust our priorities.

So we all come, trailing our burdens and griefs, all our mess and our madness, and we drop them in front of Him. Worshipping means we take time to gaze at Him, remembering all He is and all He has done.

Lord, I want you to be Lord of my life, 'cos that's who you truly are, but sometimes I'm just too busy, too lazy. Sometimes...often...I could do better.

Lord forgive. Here I am, now.

# **PART TWO...Going Deep**

Have you ever tried to have a conversation with somebody who just never stops talking, who barely stop to take a breath and the words just flow on and on? It's not very satisfactory.

Sometimes, showing up to worship also means we have to 'shut up'. Not a very elegant or spiritual expression, perhaps, but memorable.

When we meet with God, we need to shut up about ourselves for a bit. We need to 'turn our eyes upon Jesus', as the song puts it. And as we quiet our gabbling, we quiet our minds. We are then more able bring the Lord a very special gift: ourselves. Open. Hoping. Expectant. Glad to be able to stop a while and just be with God.

This is the moment when we can go deeper with God. Being still with God is a whole different ball-game. It can be difficult, but it's worth persevering. Because it's when we're still that we are open to the possibilities God is presenting to us.

We are led onto this 'Holy Ground' in worship when we've chosen to 'show up and shut up.' Being close to God in the stillness of prayer or contemplation can be refreshing, healing, revelatory, sustaining. In this deep openness of heart, mind and spirit we can allow the Lord's love to move us and soothe us. Here we find 'deep fountains, welling up within us' as God's love hold us in the stillness.

He turned the desert into pools of water and the parched ground into flowing springs. Psalm 107:35 These deep moments with God are beautiful.

It's also really important, because this sort of worship confirms our answer to the 'who do you say I am?' question. It allows us to stop doing for a moment, and just be God's beloved son or daughter: chosen, saved, loved, precious. This is worship without the intrusion of words or actions. It's akin to floating on your back, taking no physical effort, just total trust that the water will hold you.

Yes. Lord, I trust you to hold me, keep me, love me in good times and in bad. I trust you in the infinite, silent song of the universe. Holy Spirit, refresh me, breathe your Spirit into me as I rest in you for this moment. Here I am. Here you are. Together.

#### **PART THREE...New Horizons**

As we move through our exploration of what worship means for us, we come to the third part of that jaunty instruction: Look up!

Looking up, we look beyond ourselves, beyond the now of this moment into the possibilities of God's plan for us, for our church, for our community, for our world. We look up to see.

See what? Jesus talks in our reading from Luke of denying ourselves, taking up our cross daily, and following him. Now, I reckon very few of us could actually claim to have seen Jesus, but I can imagine lifting up my eyes and catching a glimpse of His back as He walks on. And perhaps He turns round and beckons me to follow Him, with one of those knowing smiles: Come on! Wait until you see what round the next bend, what's over the next hill. Come, follow me!

David is asking us all to pray about what the 'new normal' is going to be like for our Church. We're all praying about what the new way forward is for our country and our suffering world. As the next weeks roll on, we are being asked to pray alone, pray together, pray a lot! I'm sure we'll find new wisdom and inspiration as a result.

But let's not imagine for a moment that we are going to venture ahead of Jesus. He never says, 'On you go. I'll maybe turn up in a week or so!' No, He leads as Spirit inspires us with ideas and dreams of what the future could look like. But we are always following Him! In looking up, looking to Jesus in worship, we allow new challenges to come into our lives as God's Holy people.

So...being worshipful is a bit of an adventure. It's about showing up and letting go as we give the Lord our praise and love and thanks.

It's about going deep and still and bringing ourselves completely into his loving presence so He can do all He needs to do for us as we rest, recharge and rejoice in his company. Those quiet moments of total trust when we eventually stop chattering on and just listen, listen, listen.

It's about looking up, looking outwards and following Him into new ways of being his people in these days. It's about being gathered to be scattered, and living 24/7 as Christ's followers.

So worship. Worth-ship. Is he worthy of all this? He is. He is. Amen

# **Conclusion and Final Blessing**

A Call to Prayer this Summer: Be prayerful (Eph 6:18)!
