

Name: The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut.

COMMENCEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Tidenham with Beachley and Lancaut was registered with the Charity Commissioners on 23rd October 2014. It previously had *excepted charity* status.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

Tidenham Parochial Church Council (hereafter the PCC) is a body corporate established by the Church of England. All PCCs are governed by two pieces of Church of England legislation, called Measures:

- the Parochial Church Measure (1956) as amended and
- the Church Representation Rules (contained in Schedule 3 to the Synodical Government Measure 1969 as amended). They were revised in 2011 and completely rewritten in 2019, coming into effect on 1st January 2020.

Organisational structure

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. In Tidenham Parish the membership of the PCC consists of the Vicar, two Churchwardens, two Readers and the Curates, all of whom are ex officio members. In addition, ten ordinary PCC members are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) by those members of the congregation who are on the Church Electoral Roll of the Parish. The APCM must be well advertised and held by 31 May each year using a standard agenda. Due to COVID-19, the Bishop of Gloucester authorised parishes to delay holding the 2020 annual church meeting until 31 October, and it was duly held on Sunday 11 October in Tidenham church. PCC members are elected for a three-year term, with a third of members elected each year. The PCC may co-opt up-to-two additional members as necessary.

All those who attend services in the Parish are encouraged to register on the Church Electoral Roll, which is reviewed each year by the PCC prior to the APCM. Every six years a brand new roll is created; and 2019 saw the creation of just such a roll. For more information see the Electoral Roll Review on page 9.

Church members are encouraged to stand for election to the PCC, if they have the appropriate gifts, skills and commitment to contribute to the spiritual life of the parish and the management of the church's affairs. PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including how funds of the PCC are to be spent.

The full PCC met eleven times during 2020 (twice in person and 9 times via Zoom) with an average attendance of 71%. Safeguarding and Health & Safety and Data Protection are mandatory topics for the agenda. Given its wide responsibilities the PCC has a number of committees / teams, each dealing with a particular aspect of parish life. These sub-committees/ teams, which include buildings, finance and charity giving, are responsible to the PCC and report back to it regularly, to enable the full PCC to discuss and confirm their recommendations. In addition the PCC has authorised certain church members to be responsible for particular areas of church activity, such as health and safety, safeguarding, pastoral visiting, liaison with the adjacent Tutshill Church of England primary school, visiting families to prepare for baptism and Care Home services. The members of these committees / teams and post holders are reviewed each year usually at the first PCC meeting after the APCM.

Forest South Deanery Synod

• Three church members are elected every three years at the APCM to sit on Forest South Deanery Synod and become ex-officio members of the PCC. Deanery Synod members were duly elected at the October 2020 APCM. Deanery Synod provides the PCC with an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the Church. For more details see the section on page 47.

Paid Staff

During 2020 the PCC employed three part-time staff: Jane Penny as a lay worker to lead the ministry to children and families across the Parish, Ethan Richards as Youth Co-Ordinator to cater for the significant number of youth in the parish and Clare Presley, as administration assistant.

An ordained pioneer minister is serving her curacy in the parish, carrying out community ministry with a focus on Sedbury, where she serves as Chair of the Committee and Board of Directors and Trustees of Sedbury Space, a not-for-profit community group, made up of local residents who have come together to develop and manage a community space in the middle of the village.

Volunteers

The PCC relies almost entirely on volunteers to carry out its objectives, and we would like to thank all our volunteers who contribute in so many ways to make our church in the Parish of Tidenham the active and vibrant community that it is.

Risk Management

The PCC has a duty to identify and review the risks to which the Church is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against those risks. The Parish engages in activities with children and young people, and comes into contact with vulnerable people in the course of its pastoral ministry.

Safeguarding

The PCC has adopted the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy: 'Promoting a Safer Church'. It has a Safeguarding Policy for working with Children and Young People, and a separate Safeguarding Policy for working with Vulnerable Adults. These important policies are reviewed, revised and reissued each year, usually at the first PCC meeting after the APCM.

No safeguarding incidents were recorded during 2020.

Insurance

In September 2019 the PCC renewed its 3-year insurance policies with Ecclesiastical Insurance covering both its church buildings and its activities. It uses Ecclesiastical's template documents to create comprehensive Health & Safety Policies. In November 2020 the PCC renewed its 5-year contract with Chubb to provide and maintain fire extinguishers in its buildings.

Data Protection

The PCC has always taken its responsibilities for data protection very seriously, and issued a privacy notice in January 2020 as part of its review of the church electoral roll. It believes it complies with the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR). No issues were recorded during 2020.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The PCC's **Charitable Objectives** are primarily focused on the advancement of religion for the public benefit. The scope of which is reflected in its **significant activities**: -

- Regular public worship open to all.
- The provision of sacred space for personal prayer and contemplation.
- Pastoral work including visiting the sick and bereaved.
- Teaching Christianity through sermons, courses and small groups.
- Taking Christian assemblies in local schools.
- Provision of child/youth activities with a Christian ethos.
- Promotion of Christianity through the staging of events and meetings.
- Promoting the mission of the Church through provision of activities for senior citizens, parents and other special need groups.
- Regular provision of a parish magazine to show community and church ideas and activities
- Supporting other charities in the UK and overseas.

Grant making is not a primary activity. However, as part of its charitable purpose of promoting the whole mission of the Church, the PCC makes grants to other charitable organisations with complementary activities which help us achieve our purpose.

Public benefit - Church Services

Public worship is conducted by those licensed and authorised to do so by the Bishop of Gloucester, which as well as the incumbent, curates and readers of Tidenham Parish on page 3, includes two people from St Briavels and Hewelsfield - Revd David Rees, an Ordained Local Minister and Mandy Vaughan a reader.

Until the imposition of COVID lockdowns, all three of the churches in the parish held a public Christian worship service each Sunday with additional services at Tutshill and Tidenham during the week. There are also services at times of significance in the Christian calendar and at important times in people's lives e.g. birth, marriage and death. St Luke's Tutshill is usually open to the public each day for personal prayer, and access to the other churches can be provided on request to the Administration Assistant or churchwardens. The churches may be used for community purposes. Local Schools use the church for regular acts of worship during term time and for other services during the year.

COVID-19 Crisis

Revd Treharne created a small COVID working group to review how the PCC should comply with the COVID Regulations taking account of the extensive guidance provided centrally by the Church of England, supplemented by information and guidance from Gloucester Diocese. COVID significantly impacted every aspect of normal church life and activities from the first lockdown on 23 March right through to the end of the year. Church buildings were closed for many weeks, meeting fellow Christians was severely restricted or banned, church services moved online, and many church meetings were cancelled or held via Zoom.

We had to think of new ways of being relevant to the community: -

- staff quickly became proficient at being church online;
- Sunday services were on YouTube and Zoom was used for a virtual Sunday morning coffee and chat.
- Those with IT skills recorded up to fifty singers and musicians singing together and made available via YouTube.
- Hard copy of weekly briefings and sermons was mailed out to those without access to the internet
- Some people who had connections with the parish, but now lived far away, were able to join our online services which they had not previously been able to do.
- We had to cease all face to face services with schools and care homes
- Additional engagement took place via the Parish Facebook page and Zoom
- Worship Without Walls services were held when COVID-19 Regulations allowed

Tutshill church was closed from 23 March to 15 June when it reopened for private prayer, and for public worship from 13 September. Tidenham church reopened on Sunday 26 July for a weekly short communion service. Chase church reopened later in the year for private prayer. Everyone had to wear a mask on entering church and people had to prebook a seat due to the very limited seating. All churches were available when regulations allowed for weddings and funerals.

Churches closed for the second lockdown on 4 November. After it was lifted, live church services resumed on Sunday 6 December and lasted until Christmas Day when some live services were held outdoors and indoors. Although they were allowed under the third lockdown regulations, PCC decided to cancel all live services after Christmas due to the vulnerability of our congregations.

Public benefit - Engaging with the community

Built in to the Parish Vision is a commitment to 'doing relationship well', so there is a strong emphasis on building community and engagement within the Parish.

Some members of our parish are unable to attend church due to sickness or age. The ordained ministers are assisted in pastoral work by a pastoral visiting team. Their usual activities, providing pastoral care in local hospitals and via home visits to the bereaved, sick, elderly and housebound, all had to stop due to COVID-19 restrictions, but in their place an expanded pastoral team of over 25 people maintained connections and offered support to church and community members. The monthly lunches at the local Woodcroft Christian Centre, which offer social activity for senior residents of the parish, all ceased, as did the fortnightly visits to a local care home.

Online Activities were run for children and teenagers to help them explore Christianity in a fun and engaging way. We managed to hold regular virtual sessions for our Parish baby and toddlers groups. We also started a 'New Baby Support Group' that managed to meet just before Christmas.

This year's Scarecrow Trail was sadly postponed from its usual Easter break slot to the summer. From 22 August – 5 September, it provided a much needed activity for families (of all ages!) at the end of the school summer holidays. 44 scarecrows depicting Children's Books (a theme voted for by the community) were created by volunteers and located at various gardens and public places throughout the village. The Trail followed its usual route from the Lifestyle Express Shop in Beachley Road, round the village and ending at St. Luke's Church, Tutshill.

As we did not have a process for contactless or giving by text, we decided to offer the trail for free this year; the focus being on fun in the community, rather than raising funds. Predictably, donations were minimal compared to previous years, where £2000 was typically raised for church funds. 20% of donations now go to local charities as decided by the organising team.

As part of our engagement with the community our Parish Magazine 'The Link' contains articles on general parish interest and the Christian faith. With a print run of 400 it was produced only twice in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, but online versions were produced along with some 20 copies for subscribers without internet access

Authorisation

This Annual Report for 2020 was approved by the PCC and signed by the Revd. David Treharne. It is made available to the general public via the notice boards of each church in the Parish and information on how to obtain one is available on the weekly Parish Notice Sheet / Briefing prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). Electronic and a number of hard copies of the Report are made available.

Financial Review 2020




Chart 1: Where the General Fund income came from Chart 2: How the General Fund income was spent

As for most other areas of church life, the finances also have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic during 2020. The limitation of church services for much of the year, along with the need to avoid handling cash, has reduced income from collections by £13,162 (78%), although a number of donors compensated by switching to bank standing orders or giving one-off donations instead, and income from these went up by a total of £8,221 (18%). Fee income from weddings and funerals was down by £2,407

(30%) from 2019, also affected by restrictions on gatherings. However, 2020 income did receive a boost of £5,500 from legacies. Some of the church running costs decreased year on year due to the enforced reduction in activities, but not enough to avoid calling on the PCC's reserves, which exist for just such a time as this.

Total receipts (i.e. income) on the General Fund were £86,698 (2019: £88,549), a 2% decrease year on year. Total General Fund voluntary receipts of £76,583 (2019: £77,119) decreased by 0.7%, but without the legacies in 2020 the decrease would have been £6,036 (7.8%). Income from recovery of Gift Aid was down by £1,974 (14%) at £12,441.

The amount spent from the General Fund to provide Christian ministry throughout the parish was £92,143 (2019: £88,812), an increase of 4% year on year. Before the pandemic, the PCC had already committed to increase by 6% its diocesan parish share, much of which pays indirectly for clergy stipends, pensions, housing and training, and it kept to its commitment of £64,427 (2019: £60,780). Church running costs were down 11% at £16,046 (2019: £17,956) including utilities of £4,999 (2019: £5,357) and insurance of £3,931 (2019: £3,854). Building repairs and improvements of £4,251 paid from the General Fund were to renovate St. Luke's Room after water damage, and were partly offset by an insurance claim.

The net result was that payments out of the General Fund exceeded receipts by £5,445, and the shortfall was made up out of reserves, bringing the balance on the General Fund to £29,600 (2019: £35,045). The PCC's reserves policy is to keep reserves of £35,000.

The restricted fund made up of grants and other voluntary income to support youth, children and families ministry stood at £57,210 (2019: £41,955) at the year end, thanks to the financial support of donors and particularly grant-making charities, from whom grants of £37,000 were received in the year.

During 2020 the restricted fund for the project to refurbish and develop the interior of St. Luke's Church, Tutshill paid out the retention of £3,744 on the first phase of works completed during 2019, and received a further £10,168 including donations and a grant towards the remaining works. At the end of the year the remaining balance on this fund was £24,168 (2019: £18,474).

The PCC also paid architects' fees of £4,732 in connection with Tidenham tower roof, which the last quinquennial report had highlighted as being in need of repairs. This cost was met by the restricted and designated funds for buildings maintenance and development. At the end of the year these funds stood at just £3,409 (2019: £3,463) restricted and £2,326 (2019: £3,335) designated.

Including all restricted and unrestricted funds, the total receipts for the year were £145,042 (2019: £207,346) and total payments were £130,810 (2019: £319,840).

Total cash funds at the year-end were £130,581 (2019: £116,349) held with Lloyds Bank, Monmouthshire Building Society and CBF Church of England deposit funds.

Live 'in person' services were severely disrupted by the COVID-19 restrictions, but in 2020 services were held at: -

- St Mary and St Peter Tidenham on 28 Sundays
- St Luke's Tutshill on 24 Sundays and
- St Michael and all Angels Chase on 11 Sundays.

There were 11 Sunday services at each church with Morning Services on Mondays at Tidenham, plus Ash Wednesday services at Tidenham and Tutshill before the first lockdown came into effect in March. Services at Chase Church began with the Epiphany Carol Service (39 attendees) until the suspension in March.

Live 'in person' services resumed, with limits on numbers, at Tidenham on August 2nd with 14 Sunday and Monday services up to November 1st, and at Tutshill on 13 September with 10 Sunday services up to November 1st. After a 4-week gap, another 3 Advent Sundays, Midnight Mass and Christmas Day services were held at Tidenham and Tutshill before further suspension. There were no 'in person' services at Chase after 15 March except that the All Souls' service was recorded there on October 19th with 9 attendees.

The Parish YouTube Channel 'Tidenham Parish Online Church' lists the number of views for Sunday worship online. For most of lockdown there were well over 100 views, with major festivals, music and events reaching over 200 views although 1 view could constitute any length of time. The full extent of people's engagement with worship online is relatively unknown.

CHARITABLE GIVING


POLICY - The PCC authorised the Charity Giving Team to make grants totalling 10% of the surplus unrestricted income from the previous year i.e. 2019. There is a spread of charities size as well as a selection of local, regional, national and international beneficiaries.

HEADLINE - The PCC Charity Giving Team allocated £2,652 in 2020. This compares with £2,843 in 2019, £3,695 in 2018, £2,815 in 2017 and £3,492 in 2016.

DETAILS - The 2020 recipients are similar to those for 2019, but the PCC has taken responsibility for the Tutshill Sunday School's donations to Christian Relief Uganda, and 10% of the funds raised via the Scarecrow Trail were donated as part of the planned giving to the Lily Foundation.

CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY - The Church continues to support Heather Johnstone from the Church Mission Society, who works for CMS in Tanzania and manages the Rehema Project, an empowerment project aimed at helping the most disadvantaged women and children in the diocese of Mara.

Christian Aid

This year, like so many charities, Christian Aid has been adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Normally there is a house-to-house collection during Christian Aid week and, in the past, people in Tidenham Parish have been extremely generous raising a considerable sum for the charity. However, in 2020 this was not possible. Christian Aid Week 2020 ran from 10-16 May and it may well be that some people sent their own donations direct to the charity. There were features about Christian Aid week online before and during Christian Aid week, beginning with a YouTube message from Dr Rowan Williams. At present there is no Area Co-ordinator for Christian Aid, but Churches Together will be addressing this issue when meetings begin again.

Church Copyright Licence Review

1. Licencing and Costs

We obtain annual licences from Church Copyright Licensing International (CCLI), a private company that manages the copyright of many songs, books and films. The costs of covering all legally required copyright licences for our parish churches during the past year were as follows: -

- St Mary & St Peter, Tidenham (church category A). Under normal circumstances, a PRS licence is required to cover musical performances for fund-raising concerts and other non-church musical events. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, a decision was taken in July 2020 to allow this licence to expire and to be reviewed if circumstances change. At time of writing, no licences are currently in place for this church venue.
- St Michael's and All Angels, Tidenham Chase: none required
- **St Luke's, Tutshill** (church category B). All regular licences were renewed in September 2020 at a total cost (including VAT) of £708.18, comprising:
 - Church Copyright Licence (CCL) to reproduce song words that are in copyright, on a service sheet, songbook or computer projection, cost £140.00
 - Music Reproduction Licence (MRL) to photocopy direct from music books or downloaded SongSelect data for use of the music group, cost £72.00
 - SongSelect to download worship music, chords or words sheets in digital electronic format to enable the music group to play modern worship songs where music books are unavailable or tablet/projector display is required, cost £104.00
 - PRS for Music Church Licence to perform non-music such as fund-raising concerts of classical and gospel choirs and the St Luke's Folk Club, cost £72.90
 - PPL Church Licence. The PPL and PRS together, allow audio recordings (CDs, etc.) to be played on the premises in addition to performing live music, cost £73.28
 - Copyright Licensing Agency (CLA) to photocopy from non-music books such as study books, games and puzzle books, cost £78.00
 - Church Video Licence (CVL) to use clips of commercially available film which are authorised by the copyright holder for public display, £168.00

These licences expire in September 2021 and cover activities in regular use at St Luke's main services (inchurch or on-line), off-site children's and schools ministries and other non-worship events. In addition, it was decided to purchase a streaming licence for live, internet-based services. This was purchased from CCLI in November 2020 at a cost of £56.00 (incl. VAT).

A printed copy of the full licence certificate is displayed in Tutshill church porch.

2. CCLI Reporting

All necessary reporting is currently being handled on a regular basis by the CCLI Administrator.

Fabric, goods and ornaments of the churches of the Parish

1. INTRODUCTION

During March 2020, an Ecclesiastical Insurance (EIG) Risk Management quinquennial inspection was carried out for each of our three churches. Issues identified as Priority 1 & 2 requiring attention within weeks have been addressed by PCC.

PCC Buildings Committee has a prioritised list of all issues identified by, and proposed actions to address, the recommendations from this report and the December 2017 Quinquennial Inspection (QI) reports on our three churches.

The Chaplain among Deaf People & Hard of Hearing People in the Diocese of Gloucester, Revd Steve Morris, visited our 3 churches on 27 July to review our sound systems. His report was considered by PCC and some further work is needed to follow up the issues identified.

2. FACULTIES

All work carried out in our churchyards & buildings are subject to DAC approval in the form of:

• An Archdeacon's written notice, or A Faculty.

2.1 Archdeacon's written notices received in 2020:

St Mary & St Peter, Tidenham

Removal of a dangerous tree 16 November 2020. The removal of this tree is the responsibility of the parish council, as Tidenham Churchyard is designated as a 'closed churchyard'.

St Michael and all Angels, Tidenham Chase

Removal of a dead holly tree has been determined on 18 May 2020 as falling within 'List A' items – i.e. subject only to PCC decision. Wardens are seeking to carry out this work in 2021.

2.2 Faculties applied for in 2017 and granted in 2018:

A faculty to reorder St Luke's, Tutshill:

- Phase 1 was completed on 23 June 2019.
- Phase 2 works authorised were due to be completed by September 2020; as this proved impossible given current COVID-19 circumstances, an extension was applied for and was granted by the consistory court. The work must now be completed by September 2022.

2.3 Faculties under application and discussion in 2020

Faculties for restoration and reordering work at St Mary and St Peter, Tidenham

- An initial application has been made for a faculty to repair the tower roof and repoint the tower walls together with associated repairs to the fabric of the tower. Discussions with DAC on the detail of these proposals are ongoing.
- Initial application has been made for a faculty to reorder the church, including the provision of toilet, kitchen and parish office facilities. Discussions with DAC on these proposals are ongoing.
- Our Application for a faculty for the restoration of the Madocke Tomb was withdrawn in February 2021, due to the proposed work's excessive cost and minimal benefit.
- Further discussions have been held with DAC for our application for a faculty for a level pathway across the churchyard from the access established by Tidenham Friends in 2019.

3. MAINTENANCE OF THE FABRIC OF ALL THREE CHURCHES BUILDINGS

Normal maintenance of the three churches has continued throughout 2020, albeit within COVID-19 restrictions. A considerable amount of major work is still required to bring all our churches up to a satisfactory 21st century standard.

Issues that concern all our churches: -

Testing of Fixed electrical wiring and Portable electrical equipment

PAT testing and fixed wiring inspections was not required in 2020 as both were carried out in January 2017. PAT testing and fixed wiring inspections are next required in 2022.

Asbestos Registers

The Asbestos Registers for each church were reviewed on 25 October 2020.

Gutter & Window Cleaning

The gutters were thoroughly cleaned, and all windows cleaned both internally and externally in February / March 2019. This work was not carried out in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, but is scheduled for spring 2021.

• Smartwater (required by our insurers Ecclesiastical)

Smartwater was reapplied to metalwork at all three churches in 2017 and is valid for 5 years.

• **Testing of Lightning Conductors** (every 2 years)

This was carried out at each church on 20 August 2020 with acceptable results.

- Terrier (i.e. the full inventory of the goods and chattels at each church) and
- Log Book (i.e. details of work carried out at each church)

These documents were revised to reflect the work carried out at our churches during 2020, and inspected by PCC members.

4. SPECIFIC ISSUES AT EACH CHURCH

4.1 Tidenham

- The tower clock is maintained by Cumbria Clock Company. It has kept good time apart from a couple of occasions when we suffered a power cut. This caused the winding mechanism, and the clock, to stop. No maintenance was carried out in 2020 due to Covid, but this will be carried out hopefully in the first half of 2021.
- 2 The QI reports of 2012 and 2017 recommended that major work on the Tower roof be undertaken, but lack of funds prevented this. The Tower was



inspected in November 2018 which concluded that it remained safe for public use. The Friends of Tidenham commissioned our church architect to produce a design and specification to address the issues. The estimated cost of the work, which included a new roof, was £100,000, but when we applied for a Faculty in 2020 the DAC asked us to seek the view of a conservation engineer to see if the roof could be repaired, due to its historically significant design. Pat Ruddock from Mann Williams made a site visit in November, and we received his draft report in February 2021. We still hold a grant of £3000 from the Headley Trust (one of Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts), towards this work.

4.2 Tutshill

- 1. The reordering of Tutshill church is covered elsewhere in this Report.
- Chappell piano no 74809 was declared redundant and made available to Tutshill CoE Primary School, who will make good use of it.
- In September 2019, a leaking roof caused damage to St Luke's room ceiling, walls and carpet and a claim was lodged with Ecclesiastical. The roof was not finally repaired until 29 October 2019. St Luke's room was out of action for the remainder of 2019 while it

dried out. Ecclesiastical settled our claim and after a delay due to COVID-19, the following work was carried out at St Luke's room in summer /autumn 2020: -

• The floor was screeded and new underlay and carpet was laid.



- The walls have been washed down to remove the mould and re-painted.
- The wood work has been re-painted.
- The rear external fire exit door has been replaced and includes a push bar; the frame for this
 door was rotten and has also been replaced.
- Two new modern, programmable radiators have been installed.
- A new fire door incorporating glass has been installed at the kitchen entrance, allowing the corridor to be flooded with light.
- 4. A Key safe was installed for the main door and St Luke's room to avoid the need to transfer keys.
- 5. Slight water ingress into the vestry would appear to be coming from around the existing chimney, though recent storms have not seen any ingress as it seems dependant on wind and rain direction. Work will need to be carried out to rectify this.

4.3 Tidenham Chase

- 1 The PA system failed in November 2018, leaving only the radio mike and lectern mike active. PCC decided in 2019 that this was acceptable, as the cost of repairs £594 to repair the broken cable or £1734 for a completely new system to replace the existing antique one could not be justified. Further failure has occurred during 2020 and will need attention in 2021.
- 2 A Key safe was installed at Chase shed to ease access and avoid the need to transfer keys.

3 The West wall is still very damp during the winter rains; this needs further investigation

5 CHURCHYARDS

- 1. The Parish Council is responsible for maintaining the closed churchyards of Tidenham and Tutshill.
- 2. Greengrafters have tidied up the edges of Chase churchyard and the area where ashes are buried. The mowing regimen has been changed, in discussion with Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust (GWT), to allow growth of wild flowers and improve the habitat for wildlife with positive results
- 3. PCC has agreed, in cooperation with neighbours and GWT, that the debris and rubble should be removed from Chase churchyard in summer 2021.
- 4. Churchwardens are currently looking at further work to improve access to Chase churchyard.

6 GOODS AND ORNAMENTS

- 1. The goods and ornaments in all three churches are generally in a satisfactory condition.
- 2. A new electric piano/keyboard has been donated for St Mary and St Peter Church but has yet to be brought into use because of Covid restrictions.






Visit of Bishop Rachel

- In addition there was a once a month 10.15am healing Eucharist with anointing.
- The Parish continued to follow the liturgical seasons and used the Lectionary for the Bible readings. Seasonal Eucharist booklets are used.

During lockdown worship moved online with the Parish setting up a YouTube Channel, 'Tldenham Parish Online Church.' Facebook and Zoom were also used for various services such as the midweek Eucharist and the Easter Vigil.

When 'in person' worship restarted after lockdown 1, the advent of social distancing meant that numbers were greatly restricted. St Mary & St Peter's Church Tidenham came into its own as a big airy space, and the building enabled gatherings of about 50 people. St Luke's Church, Tutshill could not take more than about 30 people (with some bubbles). With Tidenham Chase unable to take more than 17 people socially distanced, and only having one entrance and less ventilation, the decision was taken to temporarily suspend Sunday worship, whilst still allowing small gatherings for funerals or weddings.

With many people worried about the safety of gathering together, 'in person' numbers remained pretty low for the remainder of 2020.

Online worship continued to be made available from March to the end of the year, to enable as many people as possible to stay connected to the church and engage in some kind of corporate worship. With a grant to purchase some necessary tech equipment online worship provision through YouTube should still be offered beyond the Covid Pandemic.

Before 23 March, 2020, it was part of our worshipping culture to involve many people in the worshipping life of the Parish: those who read the lessons, administered the chalice, led our prayers of intercession and provided welcome, guidance and information. Those who carried out Warden and sidespersons duties, cleaned and decorated and worked for the upkeep of our church buildings with love and diligence, operated our PA and heating systems, mended things, opened and closed our churches, put out bins,

joyfully rang our church bells, prepared refreshments and washed up afterwards; worked with our babies, toddlers, children and young people, served at the altar, produced altar linen, served our community, volunteered for charity and diligently counted, banked and managed money, fundraising and policy matters.

Once lockdown hit there was a radical readjustment in our life together as the church community was totally disrupted. However, the response was remarkable and whilst certain individuals drew back from volunteering there was an extraordinary effort on the part of many people to keep the Parish running; attending to our church buildings when they were empty and then re-opened, keeping the buildings clean and safe, management of the Parish and community life, contributing to the online and 'in person' worship, offering pastoral care and support, and much more...

A big thank you to all who enabled the church here to function in and out of lockdown! Thank you!!

The Tent of Meeting: Weekly Wednesday Eucharists in the Vicarage Marquee

With people reluctant to go into buildings because of safety fears a marquee was erected in the Vicarage garden to enable small groups to gather safely under cover for Holy Communion. The Vicar put on between 2 and 4 celebrations of the Eucharist on the hour back to back on most Wednesdays during the summer until the end of September when, due to the weather changing, the small Wednesday Holy Communion gatherings moved safely into St Luke's Church and continued to the end of the year.

It was a special time of gathering which may well be revisited in 2021!



WWW... 'Worship Without Walls.'



Something else that arose out of the Pandemic is the Worship Without Walls gathering once a month outside St Luke's Church. With staying still, face coverings and socially distancing not really conducive to families with children, the freedom of outdoor worship emerged. It enabled



children and parents to gather safely and freely, but the creative outdoor worship attracted others feeling the constraints of the church building and the indoor restrictions.

This provision turned into an unexpected 'Fresh Expression' of worship and church, connecting well with some different people. This too is planned to continue in 2021 and beyond the Covid Pandemic.

Creativity in Worship... in what was a 'year of worship' for the Parish

Despite being banished from our church buildings and thrown online the church continued to worship, and the lockdown and challenges of 2020 saw some wonderful creativity in worship.

The time was a massive learning curve with people having to learn how to use previously unknown features of their computers, tablets and mobiles, whilst purchasing microphones, earphones and video software and learning how to use the likes of Zoom, Facebook and YouTube.

Despite the challenges and limitations every effort was made to try and engage as many people as possible; something that had been an important feature of our gathered worship prior to lockdown.




Pastoral Care

Flourish

Youth, Children and Families

Due to Covid 19 the 2020 ordinations were delayed by a few months. This meant that Nicki Bullivant's curacy began at the end of June not with ordination but with a unique commissioning in the Vicarage marquee. Nicki then had to wait until September before actually being ordained a deacon.

Nicki was eventually



It is a testimony to the spiritual vitality of the parishes that so many vocations, lay and ordained have emerged in the parishes over the years.



The ordinations were so very special, and gave a very joyful moment of small gathering in the midst of a challenging year.

Parish Leadership Day

Little did we know that our Parish Leadership Day on 5 March 2020 would be one of our last gatherings before the national lockdown. The Day was the first of two planned days to consider our future as a Parish and envision our next steps together. The Diocese had agreed to support us by bringing in Milly Sinclair, a leadership facilitator and spiritual director, to work with us. We had come a long way since 2012 but the Parish was at a stage of needing some fresh reshaping asking questions such as... where have we come from and are we now on our journey together? Where are we going and where might we want to go? How will we get there?

The Day itself was a very helpful start in beginning to consider next steps together. Amongst other things there was a recognition that there was perhaps too much

going on and an unsustainable level of ministerial workload, partiuclarly for the Vicar, but also certain other members of the church. Milly introduced us to the U curve with a model of change that resonates with us as Christians... the death and resurrection of Christ... a process of change that defines and redefines our lives. Little did we know that lockdown would thrust us straight into change as everything stopped

almost overnight. There was an immediate need to adapt to lockdown in order to worship and minister and function as a church and the second Parish Day will await us in the future.

As 2020 ended we are still very much affected by the Pandemic. Once some kind of societal normality resumes we will have to discern what has shifted in our communities, our Parish and in our lives and discern wise responses.



Wellbeing

Many people across the Parish will have had their mental wellbeing tested during 2020 and ahead of us lies a big need for healing and recovery.



Governance

Due to the Covid lockdown the Annual General Meeting was postponed from its usual March date, and instead took place on Sunday 11 October after the morning Eucharist in St Mary & St Peter Tidenham, where the ability to gather socially distanced was best.

David Burr retired as churchwarden after over 7 years service. At the AGM the meeting stood to their feet to thank David for his selfless service which has taken place almost since Vicar David arrived in the Parish. Professor Brian Duerden was newly elected to the office of Churchwarden and will serve alongside Nicholette Flatman who continued as Churchwarden.

We have been blessed to have such dedicated servants in this important churchwarden ministry ably assisted by deputy wardens Brian Duerden (until election as churchwarden), Cate Phillips, Iain Gardiner, James Parsons, Peter Jones, Steven Shaw, Emma Phillips and Andrew Palmer. This Report wishes to acknowledge the vital, often behind the scenes, role these people played and thank them all heartily for their service to Christ and His Church.

In 2020 Colin Lee, Margaret Coombs, Roger Martin, Tanya White and Steven Shaw all ended their time as members of the PCC. The Parish has been blessed by their tremendous service which adding together the years amounted to a very long time. Their contributions were/are greatly appreciated, and this was

acknowledged at the AGM. It was a hopeful and healthy sign that new members, Molly Mayo, Chantelle Wynn, Melanie Walton, Robin Riordan and shortly following the AGM, John-Ross Henderson, were recruited to the PCC.

The PCC met regularly to conduct business and oversee the mission and ministry of the Parish, moving to Zoom meetings from April. The PCC continued to pay attention to latest policy developments, particularly in the areas of GDPR, Health and Safety and Safeguarding, with significant work carried out by Marilyn Henderson, Marion Andrews Evans, Iain Gardiner and Steven Shaw.

With limited time at PCC meetings and the need to remain strategic, the PCC authorised individuals and teams with task and finish duties to report back to PCC, something that was not always easy or possible in 2020. Generally in 2020 the groups were as follows:

Stewardship

With the Covid Pandemic having prevented gatherings and collections during 2020 the annual income of the Parish dropped. A big thank you to those people who upped their giving or gave a donation to help cover the shortfall. Without your support the Parish would have been facing a very challenging deficit.

The Parish has a challenging time ahead with its finances. As well as meeting the annual cost of Parish Share (now over £64,000), the Parish faces the costs associated with the restoration of Tidenham Tower, together with the ongoing costs of ministry in and to the community, administration and the Youth, Children and Families Project which comes to an end in 2021.

Church members are asked to consider their financial giving afresh. Some people may now be facing a more difficult personal financial situation, however others may have the means to give more to the Parish's mission and ministry. The most helpful way to give financially is through a regular standing order set up with the bank. This way of giving provides the Parish with a known income each month and enables better planning. Giving can now also be made online and through text.

Highlights and lowlights of Lockdown and the Pandemic

Throughout the year the Parish tried to keep in touch with people and get a sense of where people were at. Conversations out and about, on the phone, over Zoom, Facebook or email gave an insight into people lives and wellbeing. In addition the Parish, led by James Parsons, undertook a survey using Survey Monkey, in July and August 2020. The data within the survey together with conversations gave an awareness of what's been going on within people's lives.

Safeguarding remains a top priority for the PCC, who assess all Parish activities with children, young people and vulnerable adults. The Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) and PCC endeavour to ensure all staff and volunteers carry out the required level of training for their position; and adhere to the two Parish Safeguarding policies. It is important to keep up to date with training as legislation changes frequently.

In 2007, the Church of England commissioned a *Past Case Review*, which sought to look at the handling by the Church of child protection cases over many years and entailed an independent scrutiny of the files of clergy and church officers to identify any concerns raised that had not been acted on appropriately.

In late 2019, the House of Bishops wanted to ensure that our churches and church-related activities are as safe as possible for children and vulnerable adults, and all Dioceses were therefore asked to undertake a further review. This review process took place in January and is called the *Past Case Review 2 (PCR2)*.

Revd David tasked me to examine our files to enable him to complete the PCR2 forms. I consulted with my predecessor James Parsons and reviewed our Parish files and concluded that: -

- there was no evidence that any events had been reported to the PSO that required a report to be submitted to the relevant authorities
- there were no victims and
- all current risks had been assessed and mitigated as far as is reasonably possible.

Revd David duly completed the Bishop's proformae to that effect on 21st January 2020, well in advance of the 28 February 2020 deadline.

This year, the world was confronted by COVID-19, a pandemic that changed our physical interaction with one another. It meant we were all locked down and when lesser restrictions allowed we could meet up, but mostly we stayed safe at home with our families. Face to face training was put on hold by the Diocese and replaced by online tuition via the newly created Church of England Safeguarding online training hub.

Zoom meetings, unknown to many beforehand, quickly became the norm, and the 'new normal' way to engage with each other for meetings or activities. Our Church events, activities and services were number restricted or socially distanced.

Our Parish policies were therefore revised to account for all the COVID-19 regulations with their many implications and issues (see Children's Safeguarding policy Appendix 2). PCC reconfirmed its acceptance of the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy: 'Promoting a Safer Church' and the National Safeguarding Parish Handbook. New protocols were introduced to ensure safety and security online. E-safety rules are: -

- Follow the official Zoom links to meetings
- Ensure invites are sent out by the Chair or similar to ensure there are no gatecrashers
- Always have more than one adult on a Zoom call if working with children (parents should accompany young children)
- Be appropriately dressed and be in an appropriate setting or background
- No inappropriate photos, painting, slogans or pictures
- Remember you are on screen (and can go viral if the meeting is being recorded)
- Remember to go on "mute" when advised to, as everything can be heard by the whole meeting
- Remember text messaging and phone calls also apply to the use of appropriate language

The Child and Vulnerable Adults Safeguarding policies are displayed on the noticeboards of all three churches. These policies are reviewed annually by the PSO and by Dr Marion Evans the *Deputy Safeguarding Officer*.

Please contact me if you have any queries on any aspect of Safeguarding and e-safety. As your PSO, I am a point of contact and support about concerns you may have for an individual (this support includes Clergy & Pastoral Team). Together, we can refer anyone for help to the appropriate organisations confidentially.

Health & Safety Report

Health and Safety is a mandatory item at every PCC meeting. There were no accidents during the year. The following items were noteworthy in 2020: -

- 1. Tidenham Chase RCD2 failed on 31st December 2019, but was repaired on 2nd January 2020. RCD1 failed on 16th February, but was repaired on 18th February.
- 2. Tutshill church yellow phase electric supply discovered to be not working on Saturday 11th January. Western Power replaced a defective contactor on Tuesday 14th January.
- 3. Tidenham Floodlights restored to full working order on 31st January.
- 4. On 31 January Steven Shaw and James Parsons created a safe system of work for stacking and moving the new chairs in St Luke's church.
- 5. In March, Steven Shaw created Church Evacuation Plans for each church building, having consulted with the churchwardens and Iain Gardiner. In the event of a fire at Tutshill church, the evacuation point is Riverside Nursery Car Park.
- 6. In March Steven Shaw used Ecclesiastical's templates to review and reissue Health & Safety Policies and Fire Risk assessments for each of our churches.
- 7. Ecclesiastical met warden David Burr on 3rd March for their quinquennial review of our three church buildings. Their reports discovered a number of minor issues, all of which have been addressed.
- 8. Risk assessments were undertaken on a number of occasions during the year to assess the risks of and implement mitigation measures against coronavirus spreading during church services. including an assessment of maximum numbers who can attend while maintaining social distancing, and included a one way system.
- 9. During COVID-19 closures, our three churches were checked each week by wardens and other nominated people.
- 10. Contract with local certified Pest Control company started in July following problems at Tutshill church with a family of grey squirrels.
- 11. Two-yearly lightning conductor tests for each church were carried out on 20th August. No follow up action required.
- 12. Asbestos registers have been updated 25th October by Peter Jones.
- 13. Trench at rear of st Luke's room dug in 2019 for the new gas supply made safe. Working parties took place on 14th March and 6th & 7th November after COVID-19 restrictions allowed.
- 14. As they were 5 years old, Chubb replaced all their fire extinguishers at our 3 churches on 25th November, under a new 5-year contract.

YOUTH REPORT 2020

Youth Work over lockdown

While being brand new to everyone, the lockdown was actually a chance deepen relationships with both the youth and the families, plus a chance to support them through the difficult time.

Through our Online Youth Zoom meetings, we had 13 young people engage from March - August.

Additionally, we started a Wednesday night Bible study from May with 5 young people coming weekly. We managed to study Ephesians through to Colossians.

Youth-Led Service

We as a youth ministry have been given the option to organise, plan and put together a worship service for the wider church. We have the date of January 31sr for this service. Meeting with Rev. Janice Hamilton, we have been working with her in December to put together the service, giving as much space possible for the young people to share their ideas and creativity and help shape this service.

Youth Serving

The young people have helped serve the church community this year. An example was Christmas, where they were involved in singing, reading, playing and praying for the service. Over 7 were involved.

Schools Work

Up until lockdown, we were doing some really positive work within Wyedean School. It is still on hold.

Monday Chill Space

We had two group alternating weeks, for year 10 - 11 and 7 - 9.

In the year 10 - 11 group we had 15 - 20 weekly but over 30 come at one point.

Year 7 - 9 we had about 10 weekly, with around 15 - 18 come and join us.

The purpose of this group was to build relationships and create a safe place for the pupils to hang out.

Year 6 transition work

Ethan and the Children and Families worker (Jane Penny) were able to offer both Tutshill and Office Mead Primary school, 'It's your move' books to help their move to secondary school.

They were also able to call the class via Google Meet to share a session with the year 6 Office Mead class about transition.

School Opportunities

In Wyedean, there was a plan to meet after Easter with the Head of Sixth Form to see how we could support them. Either in a group for them or experience in helping with a CU within the school. Also, there is the opportunity to get involved with offering the School mentoring.

Christmas Social

We as a youth ministry enjoyed a Christmas Social together, where Ethan was able to deliver some Gingerbread men that the youth were challenged to design. The turn out was good with 11 youth attending and was a very fun evening.












Ethan was able to visit our youth with a printed, 'thinking of you' card with a scriptural encouragement and some chocolate to just see how the youth and families are doing.

This year's Scarecrow Trail was sadly postponed from its usual Easter break slot to the summer. From 22^{nd} August -5^{th} September, it provided a much needed activity for families (of all ages!) at the end of the school summer holidays. 44 scarecrows depicting Children's Books (a theme voted for by the community) were created by volunteers and





located at various gardens and public places throughout the village. The Trail followed its usual route from the Lifestyle Express Shop in Beachley Road, round the village and ending at St. Luke's Church, Tutshill.

We had a good number of community groups participate this year: Chepstow Baptist Church Sunday School, Tidenham Parish Toddler Groups, PATA at Penguins Pre School, Riverside Nursery, Scouts, Sedbury Rainbows, St John's on the Hill School, Tutshill Community Pre School, Tutshill School and Tutshill WI.

As always, our thanks go to all the imaginative scarecrow creators and the hosts without whom this event would not happen.



When asked why they gave their time to this annual event, every single one of the organising team mentioned the positive community experience and how wonderful it was to have something that appeals to all ages. Although paper copies of the quiz sheet and map were available for a donation, on-line sheets and answers were provided and awards given for the favourite scarecrow as voted by the public. There were guidelines on the maps to remind everyone of the need to be COVID-safe.

As we did not have a process for contactless or giving by text, we decided to offer the trail for free this year; the focus being on fun in

the community, rather than raising funds, which has always been a happy by-product for the team. Predictably, donations were minimal compared to previous years, where £2000 was typically raised for church funds. 20% of donations now go to local charities as decided by the organising team.

We owe a big debt of gratitude to the 2020 organising team that consisted of Carol & Richard Clammer, Sarah Lewis, Liz McBride, Jane Penny, Hannah Ransom, Susan Riordan and Melanie Walton. Liz and Hannah have decided to step down this year, so we want to say a big thank you to Liz for her faithful service helping to organise the Scarecrow trail, marking all the answer sheets amongst other jobs, and producing numerous very creative scarecrows; and to Hannah for her technical prowess and support making fantastic professional posters and trail maps, often adapting these at short notice. Hannah and husband Dave have also made some amazing scarecrows!

Life Group for Men

A "Life Group for Men" was started in summer 2020. I was keen that a group just for men was started and looked around for what support may be for churches in reaching men. I came across Christian Vision for Men (CVM) - they help churches across the country reach out to and encourage men, both those in their congregations and those outside. CVM's vision is for men to be gripped and excited by Jesus and to be confident in sharing the Christian faith with other men. I thought this was a pretty good place to start!

Since June four of us have met most weeks, on Sunday evenings and entirely via Zoom; we are looking forward to getting together in person. Initially we watched the Sunday evening live streamed event put on by Christian Vision for Men (CVM) then went onto Zoom to discuss what struck us by what we'd seen. Now we watch the CVM event during the week and then have a longer period of time on Sunday sharing what we've been up to, what struck us from the CVM event, and where we're at with our own journey with Jesus, and so on.

One feature of the CVM programme is a weekly catchup with one of UK's strongest man contestants (his arms are like my thighs!) – it's been interesting to reflect on comparisons between training for physical fitness and strength and training for spiritual fitness and strength – both require persistence, a healthy diet, rest, encouragement from others, and so on. We're also half way through a short study on "Making good sense of the Bible" that we'll get back to one day.

Reordering of St Luke's Church

The faculty for St Luke's re-ordering had a completion date of September 2020, but due to a hold up initially in communication from the Deputy Chancellor following submission of further documents to meet conditions, as well as to lack of funds and latterly, COVID-19 restrictions, we were unable to complete it all in time. David Burr has been in contact with the Diocesan Registrar and we have been given an extension until September 2022.

The working party (including Revd David and Church Warden Nicholette) was keen to progress the works and move to the next phase of installing a servery, with the final phase comprising sound desk, new internal glazed door and presentation equipment to follow soon after.

We secured a further grant of £4,900 from Barnwood Trust towards the servery and have received a few private donations so by the end of the year we had the funds to proceed with the servery phase and have obtained quotations for the work which we anticipate will take place during the Spring 2021.




The Link Parish Magazine


















As in previous years, we had 400 Link Magazines printed in February and March 2020. However, things nationally changed with the COVID-19 pandemic.

Pioneer Curacy

Since her ordination in July 2017 Janice Hamilton has served as **Pioneer Curate** for the Parish, developing mission with a particular focus on the community of Sedbury. Pioneering mission seeks to go where the people are and be church among them, rather than expecting people to 'come to us' and 'be like us'.

In 2020 Janice entered her final year of curacy and her focus was on succession planning and preparation for taking on a role of responsibility elsewhere. In February she spent five weeks on placement in Patchway, experiencing ministry on a new housing estate, one of the potential options for future ministry.

Before leaving on placement, Janice had started the recruitment process to appoint a part time **centre manager** for Sedbury Space who would be employed by FVAF (Forest Voluntary Action Forum). The new worker would take on a lot of the administration and management of the premises and volunteers. On her return, interviews took place and Susan Riordan, a member of our congregations, was appointed.



Before Susan was able to start the job we entered the **National Lockdown** and all Sedbury Space activities ceased. She still took up her new duties, albeit on reduced hours, and began to familiarise herself with Sedbury Space policies and protocols and to make connections with agencies and

members via online platforms. Through the year her hours have increased to the full quota of 15 hours a week and she has facilitated the weekly exercise classes and occasional coffee mornings on zoom, initiated FareShare - the distribution of supermarket leftovers to those in need - kept in contact with our users and supporters by newsletter and telephone, as well as having a big sort out of admin records and storage cupboards.

Janice has continued to serve as **Chair** of the Committee and Board of Directors and Trustees of Sedbury Space. During lockdown, this has been an important role in keeping the team together and motivated. At the Zoom AGM in May, we said a sad farewell to Trustees, Andy Royle and Caroline Sutherland, thanking them both for their outstanding contribution to the set up of Sedbury Space, and in their place welcomed two new Trustees, Mike Fierro as Company Secretary and Karen Maggs as Treasurer.

Community Minister

The 'third hat' that Janice has worn in her role of Community Minister, is essentially as a chaplain. This involves leading the Well, the monthly fresh expression of church in Sedbury Space, and serving as Chaplain to many of the activities that operate out of the centre and the wider community.

Sadly, along with Sedbury Space activities, the Well has been on hold since March 2020. Janice tried to host it online, but its drop-in style and hourly worship didn't transfer well to this context. Many of the attendees were already integrated into traditional church and Janice has kept occasional pastoral contact with others. She has hosted a couple of prayer events online during the year instead.

A new venture in November 2020 with Revd Nicki Bullivant, was to introduce a Chaplaincy Chatroom at Sedbury Space on a Thursday afternoon. This is another drop-in style activity where people can turn up for company, a listening ear, faith conversations and prayer. It was launched just before the November lockdown was announced but was able to continue with Janice and Nicki sitting outside on the pavement for the first few weeks! Over the last two months of the year we welcomed ten different people, all otherwise unconnected to church, who valued the prayerful space and support.

Conversations about the future of this Chaplaincy role began at the end of the year with a view to discerning a way to cover this aspect of her work once Janice finishes her curacy in June 2021.

Castleford Care Home Services

Introduction

Days And Times

The aim of the visit is to meet together in followship; to sing favourite, well-loved hymns; to share memories through discussion and the exploration of experiences; and to meet the spiritual needs of the residents. On average, attendance consists of 12-15 people.

Team Members

Members of the team comprise Tanya, Jan, Sue, Leonie, Ann, Janet, Julia and Dianne, whose loyal support is gratefully acknowledged and appreciated. Each participates in the service by presenting readings from the Bible, leading prayers and providing visual aids to stimulate interest and prompt discussions. Singing is greatly enhanced by Julia's accompaniment and Sue's competent use of the CD player. It is very much hoped that Margaret will have sufficiently recovered to be able to join us when we meet again.

Services

Beth, the home's caseworker, has compiled a bank of favourite hymns, for use as required, and greatly assists by always ensuring that services run smoothly and efficiently.

Plans for 2020 included further links with Tutshill Primary School, visits to St. Luke's Church and programmes involving visiting musicians and speakers. Implementation had to be delayed because of the coronavirus situation.

Forest South (FS) Deanery Synod

What is a Deanery Synod?

Deaneries are groups of Anglican parishes in a geographical area. The size of the area and the number of parishes varies widely. Deaneries have a crucial role in linking our worshipping communities together and integrating us all into the wider diocese, of which we are a part. Deanery Synods are formal meetings for conversation, discussion and decision making on matters relating to mission and ministry, not just in the local area, but also diocesan-wide. The deanery synod can raise or support motions which can be taken to the Diocesan Synod for consideration in the life of the whole diocese.

Deanery Synods (DS) exist to serve the witness and mission of the wider church and so need to be able to take strategic decisions to advance mission and ministry in the deanery and diocese. DS usually meets three or four times a year, though due to COVID-19, FS DS only met once in 2020. It is important that the synod reflects the diversity of the congregations, in gender, ethnic origin, age and experience.

In Gloucester Diocese, each Deanery is given a corporate budget for its parish shares. Each parish is then requested to meet its financial obligation (its parish share) based on, among other things, the size of its church electoral roll, its usual Sunday service attendance and the number of its paid staff.

Who are on the Deanery Synods and How are they Elected?

The size of a deanery synod will depend on the size of the deanery, but will vary between 50 and 150 people. All licensed clergy in the deanery are automatically members of the deanery synod. However, every three years, lay members (those that are not clergy) are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). These meetings are open to all members on the church electoral roll. The number of people elected in each parish is determined by size of the church electoral roll.

Deanery Strategic LIFE Plan?

The deanery is preparing a map which describes the life of the deanery, and a working document which proposes a scheme for meeting the needs of the people and communities which the church in your deanery serves. The work is being facilitated by the Revd Dana Delap from the North Cotswolds Deanery.

Why is a Strategic Plan being drawn up?

The Diocese and Deanery want to plan how we can best serve this diocese in 10 years time. Are the current boundaries, buildings, staffing and lay leadership suitable for the next decade and beyond? This process strengthens the role of our deaneries in planning creatively and strategically for our future as a varied and sustainable church across the diocese of Gloucester.

The Diocese cannot continue 'getting by' on its reserves and carrying on as we are. Therefore deaneries are being encouraged to think creatively about whether they are meeting the needs of their communities. The suggestion is that we consider starting new worshipping communities, creating festival churches, and financing new ministries in chaplaincy, pioneering, sports ministry, children and youth work and administration in the deanery.

Parish Share 2021

As approved at Diocesan Synod on 1st July 2020, there will be no increase in the budget for parish share for 2021. The Diocesan budget for 2021 is a "standstill budget."

This means that for our Deanery, there will be no increase in the Parish Share request for 2021. Deaneries are able and are encouraged to ensure local flexibility and mutual support between benefices and parishes depending on specific circumstances.

Churches Together (Cytun)

Nine Churches or Parishes are members of Cytûn and all but two of them, (Tidenham Parish and Stroat Evangelical Church) are in Wales. Cytûn suspended business meetings during COVID-19. However, the Food Bank and CAP services continued to operate, albeit in altered format, meeting the needs of many in our district. There was also a regular provision of morning prayer via Zoom during the lockdowns to which all were welcome.



Food Bank

Chepstow Food Bank continues to operate from both The Bridge and Baptist Churches on a weekly basis, with a dedicated team of volunteers at each. The volunteers continue to sort, date and store all donations, before making up food parcels to be collected by clients or referral agents. Due to the COVID-19 restrictions there were no face-to-face listening, signposting or prayer services operating. The need for Foodbank did not diminish and the numbers of people utilising Food Bank remained steady over the year. There was no increase in the number of people being referred to the Food Bank in the last year, possibly because there were other food initiatives that had been operating to help support people in need. There was a decrease in the number of families using the Food Bank, which may also have been due to the free school meal payments families were receiving.

Christians Against Poverty (CAP)

CAP continued to operate through the Coronavirus Pandemic, helping 7 clients become debt free in 2020. As of January 2021, Debt Centre Manager David Price, is helping 8 clients across the NP16, NP26 and GL15 postcodes with debt counselling, in person support and prayer. Over Christmas with support from Chepstow Foodbank, hampers and vouchers were gifted to all clients to much positive feedback. The steering group continues to meet online and can report a healthy budget.



Will things in the church and our community go back to how they were before Covid 19? I'm sure many things will return to how they were, and when they do I pray they will be accompanied by a greater awareness and renewed appreciation of our communal life together. Yet certain aspects of our life together may not return to how they were, or return at all, and that will be hard for some of us. However new things have been borne out during the year such as Zoom meetings, Worship Without Walls, a weekly Eucharist and streaming worship.
