BELLRINGING

Bells are part of the traditional Christmas 'soundscape' – Ding dong merrily! – and indeed part of worship at St
Mary & St Peter's on most Sundays. But how many people realise that church bells are rung by means of a system of pulleys and wheels known as 'full-circle' ringing, a peculiarly British invention? By altering how far up each bell is allowed to swing, ringers are able to control the timing of the next strike and thereby change the order in which the bells are heard, weaving patterns of sound – rather like the ribbons on an old-fashioned maypole.

In Victorian times, bellringing was an almost entirely male activity and ringing heavy bells seen as a sign of manliness – possibly why some clergy regarded ringers as drunken undesirables! Nowadays, nearly a half of all bellringers are women and when we combine with our fellow ringers of Alvington the band can include ringers aged anything from twelve to eighty.

At Tidenham we are blessed with six lovely bells and have a band of friendly ringers who would be more than happy to welcome anyone interested in coming along to find out more about how to ring them. Why not make it your New Year resolution? We practice weekly on Tuesday evenings, 7.30–9.00pm.





Filkin's Drift

An 870-mile walking tour of the Wales Coast Path, is a radical approach to sustainable touring. With the climate emergency sharply in focus and people looking for new ways of connecting post-covid, it is clear that the music industry needs fresh and imaginative approaches to touring.

Seeing that plaque struck a chord with me, as my own family escaped from Brussels





during the first World War and settled in Torquay. Family legend has it that the three sisters caught the last boat across the channel with their money stuffed in their knickers for safekeeping!

War is a terrible thing, as I write this article, war has broken out in the middle east, thousands are dead, Sudan is at war with itself, The Congo seems to continually be at war, and, of course, Ukraine.....

Which led to Mandy and I deciding that we should try to do a bit to help, and take a van load of Aid to Ukraine. We are going to take a journey of over two thousand miles there and back, across Northern Europe in February – we must be mad! But last winter Russia targeted the power stations leaving hundreds of thousands of people in the villages and towns along the front line completely without power, and everyone expects more of the same this year. Did you know that the average temperature in Ukraine during the winter is between 0 and - 2 degrees, and that when the east wind blows from Siberia, it can go down as low as minus 20 degrees!!

A Small Part of the Eulogy for Sylvia Lewis from her family: 25th October 2023

Sylvia was born in March 1933 ... The family lived in a small cottage which had no water or electricity and had an outside toilet. But eventually when Sylvia was about 16, her parents built a bungalow on part of the land used

for their market gardening: on moving Sylvia described it as an absolute joy to be there with a bathroom, hot and cold water, parquet flooring and a lovely fireplace in the lounge. There was no electricity at first but there was a generator to provide light.

Sylvia's parents also started a coal business; Sylvia used to help out with the coal business later in her life when she was married and used to go to South Grove once a week to do the office work. She took some exams to do with the Coal Board and was delighted and rightly very proud to have been awarded the top marks in the whole country. She kept a photo and article from the local newspaper of her receiving her certificate.

Sylvia's first job was with the Co-op, working in their offices in Chepstow. Her weekly salary was 37/6d.... Meanwhile she started taking shorthand and typing classes in the evening. Sylvia got a job at Fairfields as a switchboard operator and general clerk. It was at Fairfields that Sylvia and Charles met, with Charles winking at Sylvia on the stairs. Charles used to cycle to the office and Sylvia got a bike too so they could cycle together. They got married in March 1953 and it would have been their 70th Wedding Anniversary this year....Once married they rented a flat at Penmoel Cottages at Woodcroft and lived here for several years.

At work Sylvia was promoted to be a shorthand typist at Fairfields, but soon found she was pregnant and left earlier than expected...At this time Sylvia and Charles were able to have Bali Ha'i built at Tutshill with financial support from parents... It had always frustrated Sylvia that she left school without any qualifications so she later decided to take 'A' levels as a mature student. She took English Literature and Law and was pleased to pass both.



PCC members: -

- thanked all concerned for making both the Sunday Hog Roast and the Filkin's Drift concert successful events
- ➤ approved the new 2-year contract for utilities at our 3 churches, albeit at significant increased cost of approx. £5 £6000 per annum
- approved the 2023 Autumn schedule of events in Tidenham parish for our groups of Children, Youth and Families
- > welcomed the arrival of faculties to repair Tidenham Tower and reorder the north aisle of Tidenham church
- agreed to a trial of new heaters in Tidenham church north aisle
- ➤ agreed to arrange for Tidenham Church to be open to the public after re-ordering work, on 100 days per year in addition to those occasions when church services are held.
- welcomed that Tidenham Tower went green for Mitochondrial Disease week in September and red for Remembrance week in November
- > thanked Marilyn Henderson for all her tireless work as Parish Safeguarding Officer, and welcomed Rosalind Seward as the new PSO from October
- > enthusiastically approved the monthly parish coffee morning to continue for at least another 12 months at Tutshill church
- welcomed Robin Riordan as our new Foundation Governor of the Forest Edge Federation, as Revd David Treharne's substitute.
- noted that SSE had installed smart electricity meters in all our three churches by the end of September as promised

When her children (Andrea & Cynthia) were young she helped out at Brownies later becoming Brown Owl and made a great success of it. She later moved on to running the Girl Guides. Sylvia always had a strong Christian faith and was a regular church goer to both Tutshill and Tidenham churches and was in the choir at the latter until quite recently. She became involved in the running of church fetes and harvest suppers. Sylvia also gifted Tutshill Church the money to buy Nativity figures for a crib scene which we believe the church still has....

Sometimes holidays were taken abroad with family: coach holidays to Portugal & Majorca; New Zealand for the wedding of Sylvia's nephew. Grandchildren had started to arrive and Sylvia was wonderful at entertaining them: there are many happy memories of going down to the 'Rec' to play football. Surprisingly Grandma-Sylvia was the goalie and would try to catch the ball in her skirt!

The family all remember Sylvia's wonderful Yorkshire puddings to accompany her Sunday lunches with a plethora of vegetables and everyone who tasted it remembers the famous sherry trifles. Retirement involved the garden and their regular day trips out would usually stop at a pub for lunch. They had some regular haunts with Charles happy to drive far and wide. Sylvia took up painting, attending an art class once a week and Bali Ha'i has a number of her paintings hanging on the walls. She enjoyed the opportunity to be creative and took sculpture classes with Andrea too.

Sylvia enjoyed singing in Chepstow Choral Society and belonged to Tidenham Historical Group. Throughout her life she always expressed her love for her family and thoroughly enjoyed the company of her brothers and sister and all their families. She loved to find out about all her grandchildren, nephews and nieces and how their lives were progressing.

Sylvia's life came to an abrupt end which was a shock; but on the day she was taken ill she had been to a coffee morning with friends, had a nice long chat on the phone with Cynthia in the afternoon and then went to the Tidenham Historical Group lecture with Andrea that evening. A serious stroke later the same evening left Sylvia in a coma for 6 days before she passed peacefully away.

Sylvia was a lovely caring, gentle person who is greatly missed.


