We are working between Tidenham, St. Briavels and Hewelsfield Parishes on our joint statement of vision, direction, needs, wants, challenges and benefits, known as the "Three Parishes Profile".





New Church Electoral Roll Spring 2025

Background

Every six years each Parish of the Church of England has to compile a new electoral roll and as the existing roll was compiled in 2019, we have to create a brand new electoral roll in 2025!

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Who does this apply to?

A: Everyone!

Q: But my name is already on the electoral roll for public elections!

A: The church electoral roll is totally separate and is used to enable you to vote at our Annual Church Meeting and to hold certain positions such as sidesperson, or to be part of the Parochial Church Council (PCC), which is responsible for local church affairs.

Q: So who can apply to go on the new roll?

A: Under the Church Representation Rules you are entitled to have your name entered on the roll, if you:

- (i) are baptised and aged 16 or over; and
- (ii) have signed a form of application for enrolment; and either
- iii) are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment;

Or

(iv) are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy **Trinity** declaring themselves to be also members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

Q: I see from the application form that you are now asking for a phone number / email address. Why are you asking for this personal information?

A: You do not have to supply this information. We are asking for this information in order to make communications more efficient. This information will be kept securely by the Church Electoral Roll Officer for Tidenham Parish and not disclosed to third parties outside the church. It will not appear on the public version of the electoral roll which will be posted on the notice board of each church in the parish on 22 April 2025, which contains only your name.

Q: I am unwilling to give those details to you, but can I still be on the church electoral roll and vote at the Annual Church Meeting?

A: Yes, the provision of your phone number and / or email address is entirely voluntary and does not affect your entitlement to be on the Church Electoral Roll or vote at the Annual Church Meeting.

Q. Who do I contact to get an application form, or if I need more information?

A. If you need more information, or have any questions about the church electoral roll, you can contact Iain Gardiner, the Church Electoral Roll Officer for Tidenham Parish on 01291 624868, or by email iain706gardiner@btinternet.com

Application forms will be available at all three of our churches from Sunday 23rd February 2025. They must be completed and returned to Iain by Tuesday 15th April 2025.

Boreholes will provide clean and safe water for Christian villages in Ghana

Can you imagine not having a safe and reliable supply of drinking water for you or your family?

This is the reality for many of our brothers and sisters in most rural communities in Ghana.

Millions of people here are without access to clean water.
An estimated three-quarters of households in this West African country are at risk of drinking

water that has been contaminated with animal waste due to humans and animals drinking from the same stagnant water source.

"A cup of cold water" Barnabas Aid project partners have developed plans to drill boreholes and supply clean and safe water in 24 Christian villages in northern Ghana. Some of these are among the most impoverished and deprived communities in the northern parts of the country.

The Lord Jesus said that anyone who gives "even a cup of cold water" to one of His children will be blessed (Matthew 10:42).

> "The church has sadly never got any electricity or light to work. We can't have our Bible studies," said Pastor Raymond. His church is in a remote area in Plateau State, Nigeria.

For many isolated Christian villages in Nigeria, this is their reality. Many communities don't have access to electricity, and don't even have power lines nearby. Others depend on petrol generators – assuming they can afford the fuel to run them for more than an hour or two every few weeks.


Communication with anyone outside their village is almost impossible, as people can't charge their phones. The

only way they can charge them is to collect up their devices and send someone to travel to the nearest village with a petrol generator. Should an Islamist attack happen or if someone falls ill, they have no means of calling for help.

Like Pastor Raymond's church, many congregations cannot hold evening services. Children aren't able do their schoolwork without light. Even the most basic of tasks are tough, if not impossible, when night falls.

Those who can afford to do so buy candles or fuel for kerosene lanterns, but these can result in fires that damage property or even claim lives.







The girls and boys there are really friendly and all volunteers, they mostly speak half-way reasonable English, and are nearly all Ukrainian with a few Poles as well. The warehouse is a bit old fashioned, heated by a fire made of old pallet wood, but it does the job ok. All the donations are organised into separate bays, medical, food, bedding, clothes etc etc. Then, when the call comes in they can send specifically what is needed to any particular village or area. It's a pretty good system really.

I know Ukraine isn't in the news as much as it used to be, but the need is still there, Russia is still attacking, schools are still getting burnt out, houses bombed, and people made homeless, so with winter approaching try to imagine what it must be like on or near the front line, no electric, little shelter, most of the wood used up last winter, not much in the way of food, never sure when the Russians might breakthrough and ransack your village....

If you could buy a small box of aspirin or paracetamol with every grocery shop, if you could buy a tin of corned beef, some chocolate, some dry dog food, some thermal underwear, or if you have a bit more perhaps a solar charger for a mobile phone, or even a generator, you can be sure that such a blessing will be very much appreciated at the other end.

You can thank Prince





Location: Tanzania

What I do: Helping to empower the most disadvantaged women and children in Mara

through the Rehema Project

Tumshukuru Mungu! Praise the Lord! My work and residence permits have been approved for a further two-year period. The authorities have indicated that this is my final grant. The decision can however be appealed six months before the expiry date, so I already have an action point in my diary for 23 December 2026.

Recently we had the privilege of catering for the VIPs attending two big diocesan events. Firstly, in June, Mothers' Union in Mara diocese hosted 1,300 delegates from the dioceses of Mara, Rorya and Tarime. The conference was a time of vibrant fellowship and encouragement among the Mothers' Unions in these dioceses.

Rehema Café was tasked with catering for approximately 100 VIP guests, and the team worked tirelessly over three days to prepare delicious food for breakfast, lunch and dinner, catering for the bishops, their wives, the

Mothers' Union leadership team, as well as special guests, including a member of parliament and her entourage. Most of the Rehema team slept at work as transport was difficult – they had to get up at 3am to prepare for breakfast and often didn't finish until around midnight, which made for an exhausting day.

The second big event, in July, was a fundraiser (harambee) to contribute to the purchase of a car for the Diocese of Mara. The deputy minister of constitution and law, Hon. Jumanne Abdallah Sagini, attended along with his entourage as well as many esteemed guests from the Diocese of Mara. The team managed to comfortably cater for the more than 100 guests and served them efficiently and cheerfully.

Praise/prayer point: Give thanks that the Rehema team performed so brilliantly as evidenced by the many satisfied delegates, and the praise received from the diocesan management team for a job well done at these successful events.
