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

As I write this, it is a glorious start to the summer. Leaves are out, the sun is shining and the first blooms appearing. I feel grateful to live in a peaceful and pretty part of the world, showing its finest face. I am also filled with hope for life, inspired both by the wonderful celebrations of the resurrection at Easter in our churches following Lent (including services led by visiting clergy, the Revd Ali Mepham and Archdeacon Hilary) and by the season bursting into life around me.

Talking of hope, the vacancy for our new Vicar is now live again in the Church Times and on the Gloucester Diocese website, with enhancements to the three parishes profile based upon feedback from our first unsuccessful advertisement round.

Please join us in praying for our new Vicar, who is out there somewhere, to be inspired to come and lead us into a bright and hopeful future in the Parish of Tidenham.

If we are successful in appointing our new Vicar after interviews on 23rd June, given the notice they will need to give to their existing parish and the impact of school terms on their families, it is likely that they would join around Christmas time.

In the meantime, the living, breathing team comprising our ministry team, the PCC and our congregations, continue to work together in mutual respect and love across our three churches and St Briavels and

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
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Hewelsfield to ensure we are able to keep up our broad range of worshipping styles.

This relies on the goodwill and dedication of limited staff and many volunteers. Mission and worship is led by our Associate Priest and Wellbeing Chaplain, an Ordained Local Minister, two Lay Readers, music and worship groups, three Licensed Pastoral Visitors, a Licensed Funeral Minister and four PTO Priests. Parish leadership and management is undertaken by our churchwardens and the PCC.

Even with all this dedication, there is still so much to be done, so if you are of a mind to volunteer, you would be very welcome helping out with contributions to worship, rotas such as cleaning and many other things that need to be accomplished.

You may not know much about what the PCC does, but as well as being the board of trustees of the Parish of Tidenham, we ensure that all of the strategic, leadership and management aspects of running the parish are considered. There is strong support on the side of mission and worship from our ministry team, both in the planning and leadership of our worship in our churches, community and in conjunction with local schools. During the coming year, we will be looking to recruit new members of the PCC as some existing members will have retired. It is really not a big commitment, so if you would like to get involved, please approach me, Brian or Nicki.

Over the summer, our Missioner to Children, Young People & Families (MCYF), Emma will be stepping down from her role but still be an active member of our congregation. Emma has been a tremendous leader and Missioner, working with our schools and playgroups and bringing many new families into church in conjunction with the MCYF team of volunteers and Nicki. This is a critical area of our ministry in the community that is the future lifeblood of our parish. We are so grateful to Emma for her dedicated service to our parish.

We fully intend to replace Emma in this critical area as soon as we are able. The position is totally funded through donations and grants so we will be launching a pledge campaign to raise funds to employ a new Missioner for at least 2 years, with the intention of this carrying on







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




with further funding. We might be lucky and find the person who will replace Emma before she leaves and if not, will have a contingency plan to keep this vital work going until the new Missioner joins us. Again, please join us in prayer that the new MCYF will respond to our advert and be the person to take this vital ministry forwards.

Eve, our Youth Intern who has ably picked up activities with our youth supporting Emma, will be taking maternity leave later in the summer. We wish her all the best for her new addition to her family!

Our Parish Administrative Assistant, Annabelle will also be leaving her role at end of August after nearly four years supporting David and more recently, me, Brian and Nicki. We would like to thank her for all of her support and dedication and wish her well in her next adventure. In the absence of a vicar, we will be taking time to consider what support is needed and potentially combining administrative and other activities in a new role.

The current phase of work on St Mary and St Peter is nearly complete, and attention will move next to the conversion of the barn just outside of the church wall into a kitchen and meeting spaces.

That means that attention can now focus as well on much needed repairs to St Michael and All Angels in Tidenham Chase. A surveyor's report on the roof has been undertaken and cost estimates requested and we have also requested costings to update the electrics. We then intend to replicate the highly successful partnerships between the PCC and the congregation and parishioners at St Luke, and St Mary and St Peter to fund raise and help manage the completion of the works.

Life in vacancy continues, and although we have lost some dear friends this spring, we have been blessed with new joiners and live in hope that our combined prayers for a new vicar and MCYF will be answered and our strong and thriving community will get stronger.

As you pray, keep in mind that we are looking for someone who is deeply prayerful, a challenging, collaborative thinker and worker, able to hold differences in unity, with a heart for mission and community, a passion for Jesus Christ and developing His Kingdom in this beautiful part of the world. **Robin Riordan**

Illness



Ukranian Christians rely on food.gives for basic needs

"We thank you so much because from the beginning of the war, you have been close to us, and you did not let us down," reported a Ukrainian Christian.

Regular donations from our supporters have enabled us to send aid to our brothers and sisters in Ukraine throughout the war; this believer's

testimony highlights the importance of this provision. Access to food and other

basic necessities is limited, and these Christians rely on food gives to obtain them. "We are now left only with Barnabas' help," he continued, "and we are so thankful because you stayed close to us, supported us with food, clothes, hygiene and children's necessities."

How Barnabas helps

"We have experienced ... the killing of women and children, the destruction of our villages with the aim of wiping us out because we are Christians," said a pastor in Nigeria. "But we have also experienced love from Barnabas."

These words of thanks came after Barnabas Aid provided



food, sleeping mats, roofing sheets and other urgently needed supplies to 2,200 Nigerian believers who had been displaced by anti-Christian violence in 2022. It has been our joy and privilege over many years to share with the Lord's people wherever we are able to meet their need. "Brothers and sisters who are far away continue to put us in their prayers and send food and materials to us," the pastor added. "What more can we ask for?"

Christian villagers in north-eastern India often rely on harvesting rainwater, which may not be safe to drink

"Water is a rare commodity," says a Barnabas Aid project partner in Manipur, northeastern India. You might be shocked to read that and you should be. Water is the most basic of basic necessities – and yet many of the impoverished believers in Manipur have no safe

and reliable water source. In two Christian villages, people must regularly resort to harvesting rainwater, with no guarantees that the water they collect is safe or

sanitary. Another option is to purchase drinking water – but even this expensive solution may often fail owing to the political unrest, instability and violence that plague Manipur.

In recent years, many believers have been killed or assaulted, numerous Christian communities targeted, many church buildings destroyed.

"Their struggle to have sufficient supply of water keeps them

vulnerable," says another Barnabas
Aid contact from Manipur. "Poverty
and neglect by authorities are
startling."

I think we all gained a much better understanding of the challenges the volunteers face and why SARA is such a worthwhile cause to support.

March brought a complete change, when members participated in a Drumming Workshop, using different kinds of African drums, and two brave souls volunteered to demonstrate bellydancing as we built up to a resounding final crescendo!

April's meeting was rather quieter as we got to grips with 'Understanding Undertones' and how they need to be considered when redecorating at home. Samples of wallpapers, fabrics and wall colours were provided to try against each other, and the general buzz of conversation indicated the level of interest – and occasional disagreements! – aroused.

Now, as we head into summer we are looking forward to a May visit from Adele Owen, Director of GARAS (Gloucestershire Action for Refugees and Asylum Seekers). We have an associated Craft Group who meet twice a month (usually at Café on the Hill), whose handiwork is often to be seen displayed on the bus shelter and also a monthly Book Club who meet in Chepstow.

Our meetings are usually, though not always, on the third Monday of the month, 7.30pm in Tutshill Memorial Hall; but may take place elsewhere depending on the speaker/topic of the evening. numbers of little ones searching for Chocolate eggs. Schools held Easter services and it was a joy to see a packed out St Luke's on Easter Sunday.



MENCAP), third 'The Borrowers' (The










In March we welcomed Paul Green of Green's Leaves Nursery from Newent who regularly shows at the Rare


she was a WI member through and through having been on the Gloucestershire Federation of Women's Institutes as president and our delegate at the National Federation of WI's many times.



More about my work

The Rehema Project benefits women and children in crisis – who don't have food, clothing or shelter and who are susceptible to all sorts of illnesses because of malnutrition. Many of them struggle with the effects of HIV or AIDS and sometimes have suffered from abuse, rape, theft and mistreatment; they are trapped in poverty, with little hope.

As Christians we are compelled, through Christ's love, to show love, compassion and mercy. It is my privilege to manage the different elements of Rehema and to share life with the amazing staff.

My story

I am South African by birth and British by naturalisation.

In 2011, after almost 30 years of working in banking, account management and HR management, I was made redundant from my senior role in a business risk consultancy in London.

I felt called to do something completely different, something that made a difference, and after praying about it I went to Tanzania on a short-term mission trip.

I was introduced to Rehema and couldn't help but become involved.

This experience further cemented my call; I firmly believe that God called me to short-term mission to give me a taste of life in long-term mission.

After training with Church Mission Society I returned to Musoma and I'm delighted that I'm able to share the love of Christ with the Rehema ladies long-term.



Firstly a huge "Thank you" to everyone that donated stuff - you can be sure it was much appreciated and put to very good use. The medical stuff actually went off to hospitals later on the very same day that we off-loaded it at the depot in Chelm.

For those that are interested.. a very brief

overview of the finances.....

- £1400 for the long wheelbase van
- £700 diesel, About 3000 miles all told (we came back through the Czech republic which might have been a mistake!)
- £329 ferry (return)

We paid for the bulk of the food and accommodation costs ourselves.

We took:

Lots of Pet food, Several small generators, A quantity of solar battery chargers, High density food, Rescue equipment, Warm clothes, Sleeping bags, Lots of medical stuff (pain killers, catheters, syringes, bandages,), Personal hygiene products, Small toys for children, Baby formula and nappies

Info for next time: T-shirts needed by the guys of the front line who

have no laundry or washing facilities so they just wear them as vests until they rot! Then of course they need a new one!



We visited the Basilica (cathedral) in Chelm, a beautiful place with a fascinating crypt! But it was so cold! -10degrees cold even in Chelm, going down to -20 degrees at night!

Remembering Renate Mitchard

Following her sudden and unexpected death, I had the privilege of being asked to conduct the funeral of Renate earlier this year. As we continue to treasure her memory as a member of our church family here in Tidenham, to give thanks to God for her years of life and gifts of character, and to pray for her family and all who feel her loss most keenly, I offer these little extracts from my homily at the funeral as a

remembrance. I hope you will combine these with your own memories and thanksgivings, and give thanks to God for a faithful servant of the Lord:

'...It's always good news when somebody chooses the reading for their own funeral. It can be a clear indication of what the person hoped might be said. Renate didn't leave us *a* reading. She left us *five* readings! In those texts we hear Renate telling us some things. Things about God, and things about her.

The fact that she has left such clear instructions is quite in character of course...My stories of Renate fall into two categories: those about when she, demonstrating extraordinary patience and fortitude, tried to teach me conversational German at Wyedean School. Her determination is probably summed up by the time that she saw me and my little group of friends taking the longest possible way to the portacabin in which she did the German oral conversations, and she shouted across the courtyard, "come on! You're walking like old men!" Determined yes. But also with an extraordinary sense of humour. When I was composing my answers to the question, 'How do you get to school?', I think she rather enjoyed it when I asked her to give me the German for, 'I sail up the Wye in my submarine'. I used that in the exam! I remember the giggling, and the glint in her eye when she gave me the translation.

And then of course lots of memories of Renate as a member of the congregation at St Luke's. Including just three or four weeks ago when I was last taking the service here, and we stood chatting at the door afterwards.

Whether you're new to prayer or have taken part before, this year is another opportunity to join millions in asking God to reveal Himself in new ways.

Her readings, and actually the hymns as well, give us a good idea as to what she wanted to be said today. There is confidence shot through them. Renate's faith told her that Christian faith is lived towards the future. The Christian is the one who is, quite literally, in Christ. Dead, buried, and risen. And although we only see the promise of that here, now, as if in a mirror, dimly, as Paul's wonderful words remind us, 'then we shall see face-to-face.'

It is into that face-to-face encounter with Jesus that Renate now passes.'

Remembering Susan Pears

In years to come, someone may ask you that question. A possible answer goes like this...

Susan was born on 6th June 1946, the second daughter of a kind man from South Wales (Emlyn or Joe Davies) and his kind wife Edie. They lived in the north of London, in an area called Enfield Wash. Her older sister was very clever, and Susan sometimes disappointed her teachers by not being quite as academic as Ruth. She had two younger brothers, Robert (known as Bobby or Bob) and

David. It was a happy family.

Susan had many Aunts, Uncles and Cousins – some living nearby from her mother's side, and some in South Wales to visit on holiday from her father's side. She valued her continued contact with them and their families. At school she made good friends, some stayed in contact throughout her life. She attended Sunday School and eventually became a Sunday School teacher herself.

At Teacher Training College she made several lasting friends who in later years held an annual reunion. While there, she met her future husband, Colin, who was welcomed into her family. They were married in December 1968.

Her teaching career started in Tottenham as a Reception Teacher in a Primary School for 3 years. For 4 years she was a Housemother for the National Children's Home, looking after children who could not be in their own homes. During this time her only child, Jonathan, was born. She was delighted with him. After moving to Gloucestershire she ran a playgroup for 2 years, making good friends with neighbours.

Eventually settling in Sedbury, she quickly made many lasting friendships. For 20 years Sue was a teacher at Offa's Mead Primary School, mostly in charge of the Reception Class. She had a reputation of being kind, firm, and fair, teaching over 500 children the basics of how to survive and succeed in school, finally retiring in 2006. Her relationship with her employers was based on respect, but with a determination to raise issues that needed consideration. If anyone was going to put their head above the parapet, it would be Sue.

Susan worshipped in St. Luke's Church from July 1981 until she died in 2025, under the guidance of 4 vicars (Michael Gee, Brian Green, Royston

Grosvenor and David Treharne). She was a member of the Wives' Club in

the early days. For a few years she was Secretary to the PCC. She enjoyed being in a house-group.

Sue was always helping. She wrote letters for Amnesty International for many years. Also she helped to look after rescued animals and birds. She supported many charities including ones concerned with conservation, nature, and people in need or distress.

In later years she befriended several older ladies, and helped several of them with various practical kindnesses. Her family life was happy – she was fiercely loyal when needed, and was well loved by all her relations. She gave great joy to her husband and son.

Sue loved her animals – several cats, 4 dogs, a guinea pig, a hamster, 2 terrapins, several fish and a magpie all received outstanding care, and the wild birds were fed as well.

Her garden was her pride and joy – she was proud of the way she looked after her tools.

Susan enjoyed listening to music, playing her family's piano, going for walks with the dogs, reading, drawing, spending time with friends and family, cooking, jigsaws, Christmas preparations and decorations, and an open fire on very cold days.

In later life Sue was a Vegetarian, and that, coupled with a wheat intolerance, had made dining out and shopping for food a little difficult until the rest of the world caught up.

Her health was not always good. At various times she was diagnosed with Depression, Type 2 Diabetes, and eventually Acute Myeloid Leukaemia with Influenza that finally defeated her. She bore all these trials with fortitude. She accepted death as the inevitable outcome of



her final illness and died at home on 4th February 2025 with Colin and Jonathan holding her hands and comforting her.

Please pray for all those called to serve Christ and his Church on the PCC.




